MISS BESSIE SEEGAR

While the subject of the following sketch was only a tiny little girl when the family moved away many will recall her mother Miss Eliza Keifer who was a member of the McKenna household, old residents long since dead and her grief-stricken father, V. S. Seegar, who with several sisters and brothers still survive and keep in touch with their old home. Their old friends in Natchitoches extend sympathy.

Miss Bessie Seegar who died this week at the home of her aunt, Mrs. J. W. Latchford, 1203 Boulevard, was a resident of Houston since 1902 and of Houston Heights since 1906. She was born in Richmond, Texas, in 1895, and was only 20 years of age at the time of her death. The Seegar family lived at Richmond only a short time, moving to Natchitoches, La., in 1898, where, in 1900, the mother, Mrs. Eliza Seegar, was lost, at which time, Miss Bessie was only 5 years of age. In 1902, Miss Bessie, Mr. V. S. Seegar, her father, and Miss Geneva Seegar (now deceased) moved to Houston leaving V. S. Seegar, Jr., then an infant in the care of an aunt. She is survived by a sister, Mrs. W. B. Walston (nee Seest Seegar), a brother, V. S. Seegar, Jr., of Stonewall, La., her father, Mr. V. S. Seegar of Houston Heights, an aunt, Miss Fannie Seegar, with whom she had resided since the time of the death of her mother, besides a number of other relatives in Houston and Houston Heights. She is mourned by a host of friends who will always remember her as a devoted Christian girl, one who ever had a smile for all who knew her, and one who would make a sacrifice to do a kind deed. In such a time as this, we should not forget that passage in the Bible,
