Proceedings Democratic Executive Committee.

ELECTION OFFICERS FOR PRIMARY, JANUARY 25th, 1916.

The Democratic Executive Committee met this 10th day of January 1916 with Nineteen members and a quorum present. In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. J. O. Gunter was elected Chairman pro-tem.

On motion, Mr. J. D. Rusca, and Mr. Chas. DeBlieux, and any other member of the Committee who desires shall with the Chairman, Mr. G. W. Kile, in accordance with Sec. 25 of the Primary Election Laws, immediately upon receiving the returns of the primary, to at once open the same and cause same to be tabulated and compiled, and at 12 o'clock noon of the fourth day, (Saturday, Jan. 20th,) the committee shall meet, and the Chairman shall submit to it the tabulated statement showing the result of said primary together with the original returns received by him. That after the committee has met and proclaimed the results as herein before provided, and it shall be found that any candidate failed to receive a majority of the votes cast for the office for which he was a candidate, a second primary shall be held. The second primary shall be held Five weeks from the date of the first primary.

The Committee then proceeded in accordance with Sec. 23 of the Primary Laws to select the Commissioners and Clerks to hold the Primary on January 25th, 1916, with the following result:

School Board Proceedings.

Resolution by Dr. F. W. E. Truly, seconded by Dr. W. H. Huckabay:

That the following described district in Ward Three be annexed to the Campiti School District in Ward Four, and that the funds derived from the said Campiti School District be used for maintaining the Grappes Bluff School and teacher's salary.

At a point on Simms Bayou where the Ward line between Wards Three and Four crosses said bayou and running along Simms Bayou in a westerly direction to a point directly north of west end of L. R. & N. R. R. switch at Grappes Bluff; thence south to Red River; thence along Red River in an easterly direction to point where the Ward line between Wards Three and four intersect with Red River; thence north along said ward line to point of beginning.

Years: Barron, Huckabay, Huffman, Ingram, Martin, Miller, Sellers and Truly.

Resolution by Dr. F. W. E. Truly, seconded by Dr. W. H. Huckabay:

Ordering a special election to be held in Campiti School District, in the Parish of Natchitoches, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the said school district the question of the levy of a special tax of 7 mills on all property in the said school district subject to State taxation, for a period of five years, for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said school district.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, that a special election be and is hereby ordered to be held in Campiti School District, in the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on Thursday the 10th day of February, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the said school district entitled to vote thereat the question of the levy of a special tax of 7 mills on the dollar on all property in the said school district subject to State taxation, for a period of five years, for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said school district.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the ballots to be used at the said election shall be prepared by the secretary of the Parish Board of School Directors, and shall be in the following form:

Proposition to levy a 7 mills special tax on all the property subject to taxation in Campiti School District, Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, annually for the period of five years for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of the said school district.

NOTICE TO VOTERS: To vote in favor of the proposition submitted upon this ballot, place a cross (X) mark in the square under the word "YES"; and to vote against it, place a similar mark under the word "NO".

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Secretary of the Parish Board of School Directors be, and he is hereby ordered to cause to be prepared for use at the said election the tally sheets lists of qualified electors, assessed valuation of property, blank statements for the compilation of the vote, in number and amount, and other election blanks that may be required for the purpose of holding the said election, to cause the same to be placed in the ballot boxes for use at the precincts, and make provision for the transmission of the school district to which the election is to be held.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the polling place or precinct for said election shall be Campiti, La., and the following commissioners and clerks

of election are appointed as follows: I. Rappiel, W. F. Teer, Roy Truly, commissioners; and Dick Buswell, clerk all of whom shall serve without compensation.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Parish Board of School Directors shall meet at ten o'clock a. m. on the 15th day of February, 1916, for the purpose, in open session, of examining and counting the ballots, canvassing the returns and declaring the result of the said election.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That the President of the Parish Board of School Directors be, and he is hereby instructed to give public notice of the said election by proclamation to be duly published, according to law, in the following form.

PROCLAMATION. Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, at its regular meeting held on the 3rd day of January, 1916, I, Edgar Levy, President of said Parish Board of School Directors, hereby give notice that, in compliance with a resolution a special election will be held in Campiti School District, Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on Thursday the 10th day of February, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To levy a special tax of 7 mills on the dollar on the property in Campiti School District, Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, subject to state taxation, annually, for a period of five years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of said school district.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be at Campiti Louisiana, and the following commissioners and clerks of election have been appointed to serve at this election, all of whom will serve without compensation: I.
