PROCLAMATION.

Pursuant to an ordinance of the Police Jury of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, adopted at its session on the 14th day of June, 1916, I, G. H. Pierson, President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, do hereby give public notice in compliance with said ordinance, that a special election will be held in Ward District No. 19 of the Parish of Natchitoches on the 27th day of July, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers, qualified to vote at said election under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, the following proposition:

Proposition to incur and issue bonds to the amount of Two Hundred and Fifty thousand Dollars to run for twenty years from dated, to bear interest at 5 per cent per annum, payable annually for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a gravel road running from the parish line between the Parish of Sabine and Natchitoches; thence to the town of Marthville in ward 5; thence to the town of Robeline; thence to the City of Natchitoches; thence to Grand Ecote; and thence through ward 4 in a southerly direction to the mouth of the Saline Bayou, which is the dividing line between Winn Parish and Natchitoches Parish, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a gravel road from the City of Natchitoches to the village of Powhatan in ward 2; thence to the village of Allen in ward 5. All in conformity to an ordinance directing the holding of said special election, adopted by the Police Jury of the Parish of Natchitoches on the 12th day of June, 1916. For the purpose of holding said election, the polling places in said Ward District No. 19, shall be as follows to-wit:

Precinct No. 1 Polling place Beulah-Commissioners of Election, T. H. Knott, I. W. Mallett and W. T. Olive; Clerk of Election, G. H. Knott. Precinct No. 3, Polling place Ajax-Commissioners of election, Mack Thompson, Key Blackinship and E. J. Bird; Clerk of Election, James Blue. In Ward 3 Precinct No. 2, Polling place Powhatan-Commissioners of Election, Pink Hart, J. M. Young, J. S. Dixon; Clerk of Election, Tom Hart. In Ward 4, Precinct No. 2, Polling place Clarence-Commissioners of election, J. M. Aldredge, Tom Clark and B. F. Land; Clerk of Election, Arnold Sompayrac.

Said election shall be conducted under the constitution and laws of the State applicable thereto. School Board Proceedings.

Resolution by T. B. Sellers, seconded by J. W. Ingram: Ordering a special election to be held in the Parish of Natchitoches for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the said school district the question of the levy of a special tax of 4 mills for the purpose of providing a permanent fund for the maintenance and additional aid to the Robeline High School of the said school district.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, that a special election be, and is hereby ordered to be held in ward six School District in the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on Monday, the 24th day of July, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the said school district entitled to vote thereat the question of the levy of a special tax of 4 mills on the dollar on all the property in the said school district subject to State taxation, for a period of 5 years, the proceeds of the said tax to be used in giving additional aid and adding D. S. department to the Robeline High School of the said school district.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc. That the ballots to be used at the said election shall be prepared by the Secretary of the Parish Board of School Directors and shall be in the following form: Proposition to levy a 4 mills special tax on all the property subject to taxation in ward six School District in the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, annually for the period of 5 years, for the purpose of giving additional aid and adding D. S. department to the Robeline High School of the said school district.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc. That the Secretary of the Parish Board of School be, and is hereby ordered to cause to be prepared for use at the said election the tally sheets, lists of qualified electors, assessed valuation of property, blank statements for the compilation of the vote, in number and amount, and other election blanks that may be required for the purpose of holding the said election, to cause the same to be placed in the ballot box for use at the precinct and make provision for the transmission of the ballot box to the precinct of the school district at which the election is to be held.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc. That the polling place or precinct for the said election shall be Robeline, Louisiana, and the following three commissioners and clerks of election are appointed to serve at said election, all of whom shall serve without compensation: Luther Page, L. W. Jacobs and F. M. Caldwell, commissioners and T. B. Sellers, deputy.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc. That the Parish Board of School Directors shall meet at ten o'clock a. m. on the 28th day of July, 1916, for the purpose, in open session, of examining and counting the ballots, canvassing the returns and declaring the result of the said election.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc. That the President of the Parish Board of School Directors be, and is hereby instructed to give public notice of the said election by proclamation to be duly published according to law, in the following form.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, at its recess session of the regular meeting held on the 20th day of June, 1916, I, Edgar Levy, President of the said Parish Board of School Directors, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in ward six School District in the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on the 24th day of July, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition to-wit: To levy a special tax of 4 mills on the dollar on all the property in ward six School District, Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually for a period of 5 years, for the purpose of giving additional aid and adding a D. S. department to the Robeline High School of the said school district.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be at Robeline, Louisiana, and the following commissioners and clerks of election have been appointed to serve at this election, all of whom will serve without compensation: Luther Page, L. W. Jacobs and F. M. Caldwell, commissioners and T. B. Sellers, deputy.

At said special election the polls will open at seven o'clock a. m. and close at five o'clock p. m. and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at ten o'clock a. m. on the 26th day of July, 1916, the said Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, will meet in open session to open the ballot box and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said special election.

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
