PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION.

Be it known, that I, C. C. Sanders, President of the Board of Supervisors of Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, acting under and by virtue of the authority vested in me, by a resolution of the Board of Commissioners of Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, passed by the said board on the 10th day of October 1916, directing me to that effect.

Notice, is hereby given to all parties entitled to vote at special elections held to vote special taxes, under the laws of Louisiana, and especially by virtue of the authority conferred by Act 199 of 1916, 153 of 1914 and Act 256 of 1916.

That there will be held at the usual polling places in the Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, to-wit: Precinct No. 5, Precinct Precinct No. 1, Shady Grove, and Precinct No. 3, Vowells Hill, on the 15th day of November 1916, within the legal hours for holding such elections under the general election laws of the state governing such elections. An election to determine the question of making an annual levy and collection for a period of ten years, two mills on the dollar to be levied and collected on taxable property in Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, for a period of ten years, to run from 1916 to and inclusive of 1926, the proceeds to be used to maintain good roads in Road District, No. 22 of the Parish of Natchitoches.

To also determine the question of incurring debt, and issuing negotiable bonds therefore, in a sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000) the bonds to run for a period of fifteen years from 1917 to 1932, both inclusive, one-fifth of the principal and an annual interest fixed by law at five per cent, the bonds to be sold according to law, and the proceeds used to construct good roads in Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches.

That if the said election is carried in favor of the proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds therefore, in the sum above mentioned, there shall be annually levied and collected, the necessary number of mills on the dollar not to exceed ten required to meet the annual payments of one-fifth of the principal and all annual interest on the entire issue to the end that at the end of fifteen years the entire issue in principal and interest shall have been paid and discharged.

The election shall be conducted under the General Election Laws of Louisiana governing such elections.

Notice is also given that the Board of Supervisors of Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, will meet at the office of the Board of Commissioners of Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, on the 15th day of November 1916, then and there in open session, then and there to open the ballot boxes. To examine and canvass the returns of the special election to be held on the above date, in the Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches. To then and there declare the result of the special election above mentioned. To then and there make formal promulgation of and announce the result of said election, as ascertained by the returns aforesaid. This done and signed at the Office of the Board of Commissioners of Road District, No. 22, of the Parish of Natchitoches, on this 19th day of October 1916.
