

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF ALLEN PLANTATION COMPANY INC.

BE IT KNOWN AND REMEM-
BERED: That the parties whose
names are hereto subscribed, availing
themselves of the Laws of the State
of Louisiana relative to corporations,
have covenanted and agreed, and by
these presents covenant and agree, and
bind themselves, as well as such other
persons as may hereafter become asso-
ciated with them, to form and consti-
tute a corporation, with the following
as both the Charter and the original
subscription list hereof.

Article I.
The name of this corporation shall be
ALLEN PLANTATION COMPANY,
Incorporated.

Article II.
The purpose for which this corpora-
tion is formed are as follows: To ac-
quire by lease, purchase or otherwise,
lands, tenements and hereditaments,
and other real, personal or mixed prop-
erty and to hold, own and improve,
deal in and dispose of the same; to en-
gage in agriculture pursuits and stock
raising; to engage in the manufacture,
sale and distribution of lumber,
venetians and other wood products and
to vend and deal in the same; to con-
duct mercantile operations; both whole-
sale and retail; to engage in mining any
of the ores of the earth and to mill and
reduce the same; to bore, dig and drill
for water, oil gas and other products
and to refine and market the same; to
build such railways, tramways, water-
ways or reservoirs proper and necessary
for the carrying on of the several
enterprises in which the corporation
may engage.

Article III.
The Capital Stock of this Corpora-
tion shall be One Hundred Thousand
Dollars, divided into Ten hundred
shares of the par value of One Hun-
dred Dollars each. There shall be no
preferred stock. Of such Capital stock,
Seven hundred fifty (750) Shares of
the par value of Seventy Five Thou-
sand (\$75,000) shall constitute a
quorum for the transaction of business
and their decision shall be valid cor-
porate acts.

Article IV.
The Domicile of this Corporation
shall be at Allen, Natchitoches Parish,
Louisiana, where meetings of the
stock holders and directors shall be
held; provided, that with the written
consent of all the directors valid meet-
ings of directors may be held outside
the State elsewhere than at its domici-
le.

Article V.
This Corporation shall exist for a
period of Ninety Nine Years unless
sooner dissolved in accordance with
the laws of the State of Louisiana.

Article VI.
The Corporate Powers of this Cor-
poration shall be vested in and exer-
cised by a board of four directors.
Three of said board shall constitute a
quorum for the transaction of business
and their decision shall be valid cor-
porate acts.

The following shall constitute the
first board of directors and officers of
the Corporation: George E. Liggett,
President; O. E. Kennon, Vice Presi-
dent; C. S. Pierce, Secretary and J. N.
Shockney, Treasurer.

Said Board of Directors shall contin-
ue in office until the first Tuesday in
December Nineteen Hundred Seventeen
on which day and date, and thereafter,
annually, the stock holders shall meet
and from among their number elect a
Board of Directors to serve for one
year. Should the date of the annual
meeting of Stock Holders fall on a

legal holiday, the next legal day shall
be designated for the meeting. Each
Stockholder shall be entitled to the
privilege of cumulative voting.

The Board of Directors shall organize
immediately after its election and
shall elect from among its number the
following officers: president, vice-presi-
dent, secretary and treasurer. The
Board of Directors may, in its discre-
tion, combine the offices of Secretary
and Treasurer in one.

If for any cause the Stockholders'
meeting be not held as herein provided,
the Board of Directors shall hold over
until their successors are elected and
qualified.

Article VII.
The President, or in his absence the
Treasurer, shall be the proper person
upon whom citation or other legal pro-
cess shall be served.

Article VIII.
The Shareholders, the amount of
Capitol Stock subscribed by each and
their Post Offices are as follows:
O. E. Kennon, 701, East 24th Street,
Indianapolis, Indiana, One Hundred
Seventy Nine Shares, Seventeen Thou-
sand Nine Hundred Dollars.
J. N. Shockney, Koberline, La., One
Hundred Eighty Nine Shares, Eighteen
Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars.
George E. Liggett, Winchester, Ind-
iana, One Hundred Ninety One Shares,
Nineteen Thousand One Hundred Dol-
lars.
C. S. Pierce, Union City, Indiana,
One Hundred Ninety One Shares,
Nineteen Thousand One Hundred Dol-
lars.

Article IX.
This Charter may be amended conform-
able to existing Laws.

Thus done and passed at my notarial
office, in the City and Parish of Nat-
chitoches, State of Louisiana, on this
2nd day of July A. D. 1917, in the
presence of the attesting witnesses, of
lawful age, who hereto sign their
names, together with said parties, and
me, Notary, after reading of the whole.

SOWS SHOULD FARROW IN EARLY SPRING AND FALL

Pigs Can Then Take Advantage of
Grazing Crops and Avoid Extremes
of Temperature—Feed of Sow
Needs Careful Regulation.

In Louisiana the breeding of sows
should be so timed that the spring lit-
ters will come about the first of
March and the fall litters about the
first of September. At these times of
the year the small pigs are less liable
to suffer from the extremes of tem-
perature, and can take advantage of the
grazing crops when in their prime.

The care of a litter of pigs should
begin before it is farrowed, because
the conditions to which the sow is
subjected has much to do with the
strength and vitality of the pigs at
birth. Feeding should be carefully
regulated for about a week before and
after farrowing. Overfeeding is a
common fault at this time, especially
of feeds that are high in carbohy-
drates and fats, such as corn and rice
polish. These should be gradually re-
duced, and entirely eliminated several
days before farrowing time. The feed
should not be of a heating, or energy-
producing kind, but rather cooling and
laxative in its effect. Wheat bran is
a good feed during this period, and
even this should be withheld for at
least twenty-four hours after farrow-
ing, giving nothing but fresh water.
The pigs will not take a great deal
of milk the first week, and no effort
should be made to bring the sow to a
flow of milk until the pigs require it.
Too much milk at first not only causes
scours and digestive disorders in the
pigs, but often leads to udder troubles
in the sow. The feed should be
gradually increased, but not brought
up to a full ration before the pigs are
ten days old. It is not necessary to
begin feeding heavily as soon as the
milk secretion has stopped, even
though the sow is thin in flesh. Her
system has gone through a strenuous
strain, and should have a complete
rest for a time. The nearer she is
kept in good physical condition on
pasture alone the better it will be for
her. By the time her next gestation
period is half spent she will need some
concentrated feed. The demands on
her system during the last half of the
gestation period is greater than dur-
ing the first half; and the sows are
few in number that can meet this de-
mand on grazing alone, however good
the grazing crop is. A. R. Most, Live

BUILD UP POULTRY STOCK BY CAREFUL BREEDING.

There is probably no one practice
which will do so much to destroy the
efficiency of the farm poultry flock as
the old method of indiscriminate
breeding from every bird kept on the
farm. Mass breeding means rapid de-
terioration; proper selection means
improvement.

Every poultry raiser should provide
means for keeping a small pen of se-
lected birds separate from the remain-
der of the flock during the breeding
season. Where a separate house and
yard is not available, this can be ac-
complished by putting a temporary
partition in the roosting house and
providing a wire-enclosed yard out-
side.

The prime essential of a good breed-
ing bird is vigor and vitality. When
the chicks are first hatched, one will
often notice some which are smaller
than the rest; chicks which do not
"dry off" well; chicks which show a
protruding abdomen, or chicks which
show other abnormal characteristics.
Many of the chicks will apparently
overcome these troubles, and they will
be quickly forgotten unless some
means is taken to mark them so they
can be readily identified at any time.
All of these defects point to a weak
constitution, and mean that such
chicks should never be used for breed-
ing purposes, no matter how strong
they may look later. Perhaps the safest
way to mark such chicks is by
cutting off one of the middle toes.
Perform this operation with a sharp
knife or pair of scissors, making the
cut right at one of the toe-joints. In
this way it will cause the bird very
little pain or inconvenience. The time
to do this is just as soon as any de-
fect is noticed, such as those men-
tioned, which points to weak vitality.

While the young chicks are grow-
ing there will occasionally be seen a
bird which is sick, which is not feather-
ing out properly, which does not
grow as rapidly as others from the
same hatch, or which shows some other
weakness. Just as soon as any of
these points are noticed, mark that
chicken. If this practice of marking
the weak chicks is rigidly followed,
from time of hatch to maturity, and
even after maturity, one will know
that all birds not having the mark are
those which have never shown any
indications of weakened vitality. They
are the "cream of the flock."

The strongest of the unmarked
birds should then be selected. The
vigorous, healthy bird will show large
bone, a comparatively short, stout
head and beak, a bright, full eye, a
firm, red comb, a wide back, a full,
deep breast, a glossy, close-fitting coat
of feathers, and straight legs, set well
apart. Discard the birds which do
not show all these points of vigor.
Then, from the remainder, select those
which show suitable color and shape.

Remember, mass breeding means
rapid deterioration, and proper se-
lection means improvement.—A. F. Rolf,
