\$75,000 for Buildings, Already Pledged in Louisiana

\$125,000 Now Being Raised in a State-Wide Campaign

\$375,000. Will be Raised by Other Southern States

The old Sophie Newcomb College property, 1220 Washington Avenue, valued at \$300,000, and now owned by the Institute, is to be used for the development of one of the greatest schools of its kind in the world.

Home Orchards

As announced before, February 3-5, was designated as Orchard Week, as the best time for pruning and spraying the trees, tho that time can be easily prolonged two or three weeks, more in event that it is not possible to attend to the pruning and spraying before.

For the benefit of our readers we publish below the formula used for spraying fruit trees which can be prepared at home or be obtained ready for use at the stores that generally keep such things.

Line Sulphur Spray
10 lbs. Sulphur
5 lbs. Fresh Lime or
6 lbs. Agricultural Lime
5 gal. Water
Boil 14 hours

Put lime in first and slack gradually; then add sulphur on; work into a paste with paddle, then add water and make fire on one side of pot. Boil for 14 hours and stir occasionally.

For use dilute 1 to 6 or 7 gal. water for highly infected trees and 1 to 8 or 9 gal. water for lighter infections.

Spray on warm, sunny days.

Gallantry in Action Rewarded

Donaldsonville Chief.

The recent promotion of Lieut. H. P. Breazeale of the American Expeditionary Force to the rank of captain was learned with sincere gratification by the many local friends and admirers of the intrepid young officer, and this feeling of pleasure will be augmented by one of glowing pride now that it has become known that the advancement was earned through gallantry in action. A copy of the original recommendation taking cognizance of Lieut. Breazeale's courageous leadership has been received by Mrs. Breazeale, who before her marriage was Miss Nita Sims, of this city. The document is dated at the head quarters of the 358th Infantry, Oct. 12, 1918, and recommends the elevation of Lieut. Breazeale to rank of captain "for services during the offensive operations in which the regiment was engaged on Sept. 12, 13, 14 and 15, and Sept. 25 and 26, 1918." The recommendation was made by a board of officers consisting of Lieut. Col. James W. Everington, Captain Hubert G. Peters and Captain Willis L. McSpedden, all of the 358th Infantry, and approved by Col. E. M. Leary, commanding the regiment. Capt. Breazeale is now in Germany with the American army of occupation and in addition to his military duties as Company Commander, has been appointed Provost, corresponding to our Circuit Judgeship, over twelve German towns.

The friends of Capt. W. E. Aymond will be happy to learn that he has returned from overseas, and is now with his battalion at Camp Humphrey, Va., awaiting honorable discharge, and all hope it won't be long before he will be back home, where a cordial welcome awaits him. The camp paper has this to say about the battalion to which he belonged:

Fresh from the battle-scarred field of Europe, where its members had seen service with the British, French and American armies since 1917, the First Battalion of the 66th Engineers arrived in Camp Humphreys, January 21st. This famous battalion, which has twice been commended for its work, consists of Companies F, I and K, in charge of Capt. George F. Young, and the companies are commanded, respectively, by Capt. John H. Gross, Capt. Walter E. Aymond and First Lieut. Noice A. Traphagan. The Regiment is commanded by Lieut. Col. John C. Gotwals.

The personnel is made up of veterans as well as short-term men, the latest arrivals in the Battalion having been overseas about three months, while the old service men have eighteen months to their credit. The latter have seen much service, a few of them being engaged in with the Royal Engineers of the British Army at the time of the bloody spring offensive, when the Germans made their mighty effort for the Channel ports. These men did valiant service, and each returned to Paris the proud possessor of a letter of commendation from Sir Julian Byng, of the Third Army, G. I. 672.

The specialty of this unit is anti-

aircraft defense work, and the duty of these Engineers was to remain above the ground during night raids while the rest of the population was well fixed deep in cellars and dugouts. The searchlights did excellent work in locating the famous Gothas and aiding the artillerymen and allied planes in locating their quarry. It is said that after the American searchlights went into active service around the city of Amiens, bombing raids of the Huns here decreased 40 per cent.

In addition to the commendations which this Battalion received, there are several modest heroes who have been decorated with the allied war crosses for exceptional conduct and action in the field of combat.
