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Have You Started Your Fall Garden?

Many people have the erroneous idea that the Home Demonstration work is merely the promotion of the best methods of canning, preserving and pickling; but important as that is, it is only the initial step in the tremendous effort being put forth by our National Government for improved living conditions in the home.

We must get away from the idea that because a woman has a pantry full of canned vegetables that she is necessarily a good manager. Industrious she undoubtedly is, but she may be using very poor judgment. Let us take a look at her garden. If she is a good manager, she has, right now, in her garden, snap beans, butter beans, green peas, tomatoes, okra, egg plant, squash, corn, pepper, and cucumbers. These she will continue to have until frost. In addition to this, she is planting, or has just planted, Irish potatoes, young tomato plants (or cuttings from the old plants), turnips and mustard. Within a few days she will have a finely pulverized seedbed sowed with cabbage and lettuce seed to be transplanted in late September for fall heading. She will also plant beets, carrots, bush beans, and, a little later, begin a series of plantings of radishes, mustard, spinach, onions, etc.

The woman who has bushels of beans for about six weeks in the spring, and then expends a great deal of energy and money canning scores of jars of them when she could have them fresh from her garden from April to November is undoubtedly NOT a good manager. She cans cabbage, carrots, etc., that should be gathered fresh from the garden almost continuously from October to May. There is not a week in the year (unless phenomenal weather conditions prevail) that we cannot have several vegetables in the garden. What we must do, if we manage well, is to get the maximum good from the garden and a minimum amount of canning during the sweltering summer months. Put up a plentiful supply of fruits, preserves, jellies, pickles, etc., and can and dry the vegetables that cannot be had for a long winter period, such as tomatoes, okra, corn, English peas and perhaps a few beans, but it will not take much of those vegetables if the garden serves its best purpose.

Of course, in many cases, the women can't get the help they must have to be successful, for some farmers think gardening is rank foolishness and "piddling" work for women and children. Beneath the dignity of a self-respecting man. We have taken note, in our travels, however, that the self same man does not find it beneath his dignity to devour huge quantities of the good things from that garden. The man who will not give his wife all possible cooperation in her gardening (for it is, or should be, a large part of the family support) should be condemned to eat bread and fat fried meat until he has had a change of heart.

Right here in Natchitoches, last winter, when lettuce was fifteen cents a head at the grocery stores, there were some people who had magnificent heads of lettuce growing in the open garden.

We are living in the garden spot of the world, and if we take advantage of its possibilities, we can be the healthiest, happiest, most thrifty people to be found in the United States.

This year especially, with the plentiful rains, it will be absolutely inexcusable if we do not have magnificent fall gardens.

Will YOU volunteer to join this garden army, that can bring about a wonderful revolution in our fair land?

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
