**AN APPRECIATION.**

I wish to take this means of expressing to the citizens of Natchitoches my very deep appreciation for the sentiment expressed in the petition that appeared in the press of last week and to the editors of our two papers for their most generous comments on my life and labors in this community. I have tried to live among you as one who serves and this expression of your appreciation is very gratifying indeed to me.

My association with the Red Cross workers in Natchitoches has been a source of constant joy and inspiration and whatever success the Home Service Section of this Chapter has had, is due in large measure, to the splendid work and cooperation of the committees both in Natchitoches and throughout the parish. My hat comes off to each and every one of these and I want the public to know and appreciate their labors.

The experiences I have had in this work for the past months are invaluable. Every minister is called upon to do much social work, but I have had unusual opportunities and experiences which shall always stand out as bright spots in my memory. I did not go into this work with any intention of giving up my work as a minister. The government was depending upon the Red Cross to minister to the needs of the soldiers, sailors and their families, and, upon the insistence of the local chapter and the consent of my church I entered this enlarged field that I might be able to do my bit for the fellows who had done their part so bravely in camp and overseas. I shall always look with pride to the part I have thus had in this work.

Now the work is being enlarged. Assistance is to be rendered unto those who are in need of it regardless of their relation to the war. It has grown to such proportions that it will require all of a trained worker's time in order that it may reach out and meet all of the possibilities. Noble though this work is, it is not my life's work and I have asked the executive committee to release me just as soon as they can find someone to take my place.

I have assured the Executive Committee that I do not intend to leave the work so hastily as to embarrass the Red Cross activities. They are now looking for my successor and as soon as he is found, I shall sever my connections with the work. My only reason for doing so is that I have a loftier and higher mission to fill than that of a social worker and I shall enter some other field where I shall carry on this mission and do social work also. It may be that I shall remain with you a few months yet. If so I shall continue in the dual capacity in which I have heretofore worked, giving part of my time to Red Cross activities and part to my distinctively religious duties.

Again thanking you each and all for your expressions of appreciation and assuring you that I believe a work has been begun in this community which cannot be stopped but which will continue and accomplish greater and greater things, I am
