Breazeale who explained very clearly the whole system of voting, the requisites for qualifying, registering; manner of casting vote, and the duties of the commissioners and clerks; getting the returns etc. A number of questions were asked and he explained so well all the mysteries shrouding the forbidden fruit to the gentler sex, that after he turned over the tally sheets to the Secretary of State, each and every suffragist present felt that she would be qualified to go through the whole process unaided when Louisiana's millennium expect will be before the next general election.

Mrs. Percy Prudhomme After a long illness the gentle spirit of Mrs. Percy Prudhomme passed away Friday afternoon and the funeral took place Saturday morning at 11 o'clock, when after services at the cathedral, the remains were interred in the family burial plot in the French cemetery.
