The news of the death of Dr. A. B. Nelson of Shreveport, which occurred in Albuquerque, New Mexico last Sunday, deeply shocked and grieved his many friends in this town and parish.

He was stricken a month or more ago with a slight attack of pneumonia, and was taken to New Mexico in the hope that the climate there would hasten his recovery.

His life demonstrates what wonderful things lie within the reach of the American boy and man. A poor country boy, he fought his way without money or family influence, from the humble country school through one of the world famous medical colleges in Germany, and before he was forty years old took his place in the front rank of surgeons in this country. And in addition to his fame in his chosen profession, he

had achieved a position in the state as a man of broad education, a gentleman of culture, a charming companion and a most lovable man.

Before his splendid powers had reached their full maturity, in the midst of the joyous struggle of life, which daily witnessed the realization of his ambitious dreams, he passed away.

The sweet peace of a soul at rest is his.

But for the lonely woman who loved and cheered and inspired him, the heart is filled with tender sympathy. Only the Master whom they both served so faithfully in this life can comfort her.


