Police Jury Proceedings.

Special Meeting, Police Jury, Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana.
WEDNESDAY, DEC. 7th, 1921

The Hon. Police Jury met in special session as per special call by the President, with President Airey presiding, and all members present except Mr. Page.

The President announced that the Meeting was called in accordance with a letter from His Excellency, Hon. John M. Parker, calling the Police Jury's attention to the fact that the Registrar of Voters must be appointed before Dec. 15th, if not said appointment would be made as provided for in Section 18, Article VIII paragraph third of the Constitution 1921. The letter was then read and the following action taken.

By Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Copellier:
In view of the fact that this Body feels that voting by proxy is not permissible. Be it resolved that the Proxy of W. W. Page be not considered.

Yeas: Sandlin, Joyner, Copellier, Airey, Friedman and Dowden.
Nays: Knott, Phillips and Dowden.
(Carried)

The Secretary of the Police Jury announced that there was on file Six Application for Registrar of Natchitoches Parish.

That of A. C. Knott,
That of E. L. McFerrin,
That of L. E. Plaisance,
That of Thos. F. Porter.
Each name was submitted and a vote taken there on which resulted as follows:

Breazeale, one vote; M. J. Weaver, one vote; A. C. Knott, two votes; McFerrin, no votes; Porter, four votes; Plaisance, one vote.

Porter and Knott being the two highest in votes the following vote was taken for the election of either which resulted as follows:

For Mr. Porter: Mr. Sandlin, Mr. Copellier, Mr. Phillips, Mr. Friedman and Mr. Lacaze.

For Mr. Knott: Mr. Joyner, Mr. Airey, Mr. Knott, Mr. Dowden.

Mr. Porter having received the majority of votes cast was declared Elected Registrar of the Parish of Natchitoches.

Whereas: The State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, request the parish to advance the estimated cost of making said surveys, maps, plans, investigations, reports, etc., on the basis of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per mile for each mile of road applied for, and

Whereas: The State Highway Department, Board of State Engineers, agree to refund to the parish any of the above fund over and above the amount necessary to cover the cost of said surveys, maps, plans, investigations, reports, etc., together with an itemized statement showing the exact amount expended in making same, and
