Among old colonial records, a note issued by the State of Mass. was recently found, in which the State promised to repay the loan in current money according as five bushels of corn, sixty-eight and four-sevenths pounds of beef, ten pounds of wool and sixteen pounds of leather should at the time of payment be worth more or less than a stated sum at current prices. Here was the principle of the "stabilized dollar" in use one hundred and forty three years ago, which it appears was introduced on account of the notorious instability of Continental currency which was not only insufficiently secured but subject to continental counterfeiting. The plan was not employed after our money got back to a fairly sound basis. The idea of adopting it as the permanent foundation of the currency seems not to have occurred to any one in the eighteenth century.

Company "C" Prepares For Flood Duty Call

Governor Parker has instructed the Adjutant General to have all national guard organizations held in readiness for immediate duty in the flood zones in case they are required, and Company "C" has been instructed to be prepared to move on the first train after a call.

The Mayor of Natchitoches has co-operated to the extent of ordering a special signal to be used on the Fire Whistle in event Company C is ordered mobilized, which signal will be five blasts of the whistle each 1/2 minute long with a one minute interval between each. Notice is given the public of this signal so that it will cause no misunderstanding or inconvenience to the public.

In event of call, state troops would probably be used to establish refugee camps and work the refugees, administering relief under the government and state authorities.

At the regular drill Monday night, arrangements were made for mobilizing, transportation, rations, etc., and it is believed that this company will be able to move on short notice in event it is required in the flood danger zone.

Encampment of the national guard of Louisiana will be held this summer sometime between the first and eighth of August. All members are expected to make arrangements to attend as only the most urgent reasons will be accepted by the national authorities for absence from this duty and training.
