No one will be allowed to vote in the State of Louisiana unless registered after January 1st 1922, up to date the registration is very small. In some precincts there are not enough registered to be election official. I will be in my office again for registration on Wednesday April 19th 1922, the day after the Senatorial Election and in order to give the voters an opportunity to register before any election which may come up, in the near future I shall keep my office open every day, between the hours of 9 A. M. to 1 P. M. and from 2 P. M. to 6 P. M. for the remainder of the month of April 1922. Sunders accepted and thereafter my office will be open as usual.

PROCLAMATION

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Natchitoches Parish School Board of Natchitoches Parish, Louisiana, at a meeting held on the 11th day of April, 1922, I, Z. T. Gallion, Jr., President of the said Parish School Board, do hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in the Parish of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on the 23rd day of May, 1922, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition to-wit:

To levy a special tax of two and one-half mills on the dollar on all the property in Natchitoches Parish, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of two years, beginning with the year 1922 and ending with the year 1923, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools.
For the purpose of said special election the polling places will be Natchitoches Precinct 1, Natchitoches Precinct 2, Ashland, Chestnut, Goldonna, Strange, Messick, Powhatan, Grappes Bluff, Campiti, Clarence, Marthaville, Beulah, Ajax, Spanish Lake, Robeline, Shady Grove, Provencal, Vowells Mills, Kisatchie, Mora, Gorum, Natchez, Cypress, Montrose, Chopin, Cloutierville, Marco, and the following three commissioners and clerks of election are appointed to each respective polling place:


