Primary for Nominating Candidates for Parish School Board Members

The Parish Democratic Executive Committee met this 14th day of July, with a quorum present, for the purpose of providing for holding a Primary Election to nominate candidates for Member of the Parish School Board.

The following resolution, offered by J. B. Tucker, was adopted:

Resolved, that a Primary Election is hereby ordered to be held in Wards 3, 9, 10, on

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 1922

for the nomination of candidates for Member of the Parish School Board, to be elected at the general election November 7th, 1922.

Candidates shall file their announcement with the Secretary of this committee by 6 o'clock P. M., on July 24, 1922, certifying that they are duly qualified electors under the Constitution and laws of the State, and that they are members of the Democratic Party calling this primary, and accompany same with the fee of \$5.00, which is hereby assessed.

This committee shall meet at 12 o'clock M., on August 17, 1922, for the purpose of appointing officers and selecting commissioners and clerks to hold and conduct said primaries, in accordance with Section 23 of Act 35 of 1916.

Should a second primary be necessary it shall be held on October 17, 1922.

The following resolution was offered by Mr. Breasole:

Whereas, there are vacancies in the membership of this committee from Wards Three and Seven, therefore, Be it resolved, that said vacancies be filled by the committee at the meeting on August 17, 1922, in accordance with authority under law. (Adopted)

There being no other business, the committee adjourned to meet October 17, 1922.
