We extend our very hearty thanks to Mr Arnaud Broussard chairman of the Broussard Excursion Club of Breauk Bridge for a ticket to New Orleans on the 7th of January, good until the 10th. The cost of this round trip will be \$2.75 from New Iberia and we do not doubt but that many of our citizen will take advantage of these cheap rates.

On Saturday last Mr J. E. Kerrigan, was engaged in establishing the line of the curbing on Main street. He started at a point on the bayou at the foot of Corinne street which was established by Mr. H. C. Minor in 1854 when he made a map of the western end of this city for Mr. Harvey Hopkins. Mr. Kerrigan found the curb line very much out of position in some places.

The Blanchet store on Main and Iberia streets, is being thoroughly renovated and repaired to be used by Mr. Paul A. Ross in the very near future as a grocery store. Messrs Keller and Carlin have the contract. These gentlemen have also taken the sub-contract from Messrs A. L. and A. C. Etie for the wood work in the Doerle building corner St. Peter and Iberia streets.

In company with Mr. Emile (Capt.) Moresi, we drove out to the Grand Mararie bridge on last Monday, to view the dredge boat which is being constructed to dig the Iberia and St. Mary drainage canal. A force of about fifteen men are engaged at work, and are apparently making rapid headway on the job. The boiler and smoke-stack have been hauled out, with part of the machinery and other material. The boat will be 87 feet in length and 30 in breadth, and built with the best hard cypress, and all other appurtenances that will add strength and durability. Some of the material to be used is second-hand, but will doubtless serve as good as new, and the fact that the contractor, Mr. Rogers, is a man of long experience and vast knowledge in this line of work insures it being done properly. Another pit is being dug in which to place the boat as soon as the hull is completed.—Iberia Parish Times.
