THE TWELFTH CENSUS.

Some facts, relative to this most important work, which will be shortly commenced, may be of interest to our readers.

The act of March 3, 1899, under the provision of which the Twelfth Census of the United States is to be taken, provides for the appointment of supervisors of census, one or more to each State, or Territory in the Union, and the Hawaiian Islands. These supervisors will have general supervision within their respective districts. One of the most important duties imposed upon them is the designation of suitable persons to be employed, with the consent of the Director of the Census, as enumerators within their respective districts. It is also provided by the act that these enumerators must be residents of the enumeration district for which they are appointed. This, in our opinion is a wise provision, the benefits of which will be readily seen and understood. The enumerators are to be employed solely with reference to fitness, without reference to their political affiliations. The appointment of the enumerators, or census takers will be made with due regard to physical activity, neatness and accuracy in writing, and the use of figures. The census requires, active energetic persons of good address and readiness with the pen.

The enumeration required by the Census Act will commence on the 1st day of June, 1900, and must be completed within two weeks in all cities of 8,000 inhabitants or more, where that number was reported in the year 1890, and in other districts on or before the 1st of July, next thereafter. Under the provisions of Sec. 7 of the Census Act, the enumeration is restricted to inquiries relating to the population, to mortality, to the products of agriculture and of manufacturing and mechanical es-

tablissements. Thus it will be seen that there are four heads under which the census will be taken.

The requirements of the act of the persons employed to enumerate the census are very strict, and any such person who, without justifiable cause, neglects or refuses to perform the duties of his position, after accepting it, or who communicates to any person not authorized to receive the same, any information gained by him in the performance of his duties, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding \$500.

Now, while these duties appear to be very arduous, the work of the enumerators can be greatly facilitated by the citizens themselves, by giving to the persons employed, in an intelligent manner all the desired information. As the census of this year promises to be the most complete of any the country has ever had, every inhabitant should work to that end in making it so.

In the year 1890 the aggregate population of the United States was 50,155,783 an increase over the previous census of 30.08 per cent. In 1890 the aggregate population was 62,622,250 or an increase of 24.86 per cent over 1890. Now, what the population of today foots up to, is only conjectured, but of one thing we are sure, that in the past ten years this country of ours has made more progress in every respect than in any similar period of time.

The statistics of the Twelfth Census will be anxiously awaited by all who are interested, and we predict that when these figures are made known every one will be surprised at the rapid growth of the United States in the past ten years.

Space does not permit of a more lengthy article on this almost inexhaustible subject, but we shall endeavor at some future time to give other information upon the great work of the Enumeration of the Twelfth Census.
