SPECIAL COMMISSION APPOINTED

To investigate the Assessments of this and Other States.

Hon. John A. McIlhenny Was the Author of the Bill.

Baton Rouge La., Jan. 1, 1907.

One of the first official actions taken by Governor Blanchard when he reached the executive office this morning after an illness of several days, was the appointment of the members of the Special Commission, according to Act 191 of 1906, to investigate the assessment conditions in this and other States of the Union. Following will compose this Commission: Edgar H. Farrar, New Orleans; John A. McIlhenny, Avery T. J. Kernan, Baton Rouge; Edward McCullum, Ellendale; Chas. J. Theard, New Orleans; M. H. Carver, Natchitoches; W. O. Hart, New Orleans; T. C. Barret Shreveport; Ashton Phelps, New Orleans; Ovide Lacour, Racourci; Pearl Wight, New Orleans; A. Brittin, New Orleans; R. N. Sims, Donaldsonville; Dr. A. A. Forsythe, Monroe; James O'Connor, New Orleans

The Governor has had the matter of making the appointments under consideration for some time, and has selected strong men, representing different sections of the State. The Commission will make its report at the next session of the General Assembly, John A. McIlhenny, of Avery, who was appointed on the Commission, was the author of the bill authorizing the appointment of the Commission.

Cotton Market Evils.

New Orleans, Jan. 3.—It now appears evident that some radical and far reaching reforms in cotton market methods will follow in the wake of the current wide spread agitation, two of which are of greatest importance to the cotton producing states. The farming interests of the South have determined that New York's unfair contract which enables the speculator to "bear" the price of the staple through the tender of undesirable cotton at unwarranted values must be eliminated and that the New York Exchange henceforth must be operated in the manner and under the fair rules that govern the conduct of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange, and in the event this reform be not forthcoming means will be employed to bring federal pressure into play in an effort to put the New York Cotton Exchange out of business. To this end the Southern Cotton Association has announced its intention of calling upon the Post Office department to issue a fraud order against the New York Cotton Exchange.

The second reform the South, through its State Legislatures, will demand is the complete elimination of the bucket shop and of bucketshopping, a way having been found by the Minnesota Legislature to successfully accomplish this end by means of a provision that reads:

"It shall be the duty of every commission merchant, copartnership, association, corporation or broker, doing business as such, to furnish every customer, or principal for whom such commission merchant, broker, copartnership, corporation or association has executed any order, for the actual purchase or sale of the commodities hereinbefore mentioned (grain, provisions, cotton, petroleum or stocks and bonds), either for immediate or future delivery, a written statement containing the names of the parties from whom such property was bought, or to whom it shall have been sold, as the case may be, the time when, the place where, and the price at which the same was either bought or sold, and in case such commission merchant, broker, copartnership, corporation or association fails to properly furnish such statement, the fact of such failure shall be prima facie evidence that such property was not sold or bought in a legitimate manner."

The act above quoted defines a bucketshop to be a place where commodities are traded in without intention to effect a delivery. A severe penalty is provided for violation of the law.

Competent authorities in Minnesota assert that since the new law was enacted every bucketshop in the state has closed up but that the legitimate and necessary business of future trading has not been adversely affected, nor has the extensive news service maintained by authorized brokerage houses, and which during recent years has become a very valuable adjunct to buyers and sellers of grain, cotton, and stocks and bonds all over the country, been curtailed by the law's restrictions.

Within the past two weeks many letters have been received from Texas, Alabama and other Southern States by representative New Orleans cotton men asking information as to the best methods that may be employed to drive the bucketshops out but without injuring the New Orleans Cotton Exchange which represent the producer's interest in the struggle for cotton price control.

Sells Money and Approves Loans at Regular Meetings of Directors.

The Annual Meeting Will be held on the 15th inst.

The board of directors of the Iberia Building Assn. met on Wednesday evening at the usual hour, with President E. F. Millard in the chair and the following directors in their seats: J. A. Fagot, Lazard King, W. J. Burke, and G. C. Laughlin Absent, J. W. Taylor and Jno. E. Schwing.

The Secretary's report showed that Series No. 79 had closed on December 31, with an issue of 179 shares. Series 80 opened on Jan'y 1 and by Wednesday evening 50 shares had been issued in the new series. Since the last regular meeting 61 shares of new stock had been issued.

At the sale of money the following adjudications were made: Valmore Olivier, 4 shares at 25¢; Chas. Viator, 8 " " 25¢; W. L. Burke, 8 " " 25¢; Chas. Jones, 3 " " 25¢; J. J. Lamperz, 6 " " 25¢; Martin Sanders, 3 " " 25¢.

This sale of 32 shares was effected in a very few minutes, as the bidders were remarkably prompt and decisive in their bids.

The following applications for loans were reported by the Appraisal committee and after examination by the board, were approved upon the usual conditions of clear titles, etc:

Henry Green, Jeanerette, a loan of \$600, secured by 12 arpents of land near the corporation limits.

Fred Green, Jeanerette, an additional loan of \$600 on a residential property in the town of Jeanerette.

Mrs. Daisy Guilbertean, Jeanerette, \$1200 on a residential property in the town of Jeanerette.

L. J. Gautreau, 821 Center St., this city, an additional loan of \$400 to make extensions to his residence.

The annual meeting of the stockholders will take place at the office of the Association on Tuesday evening, January 15th, at 7:30 o'clock, at which meeting a board of directors will be elected to manage the affairs of the Association for the ensuing year. The following supervisors of election were appointed for the occasion: Messrs. Albert De Blanc, C. E. Reynolds and Max Levy.
