## WHEY BUTTER.

Its Manufacture as a By-product Proves Profitable in Larger Cheese Factories.

Many cheese factories run the whey through a separator and make butter from the cream thus obtained. This has been found by experience to be so profitable that the dairy experts in the department advise all cheese factories that receive 10,000 or more pounds of milk daily to put in an equipment for making whey butter.

After studying the possibilities of making this kind of butter in American Cheddar cheese factories, the department, in 1909, cooperated in the equipment of a large factory in Wisconsin for this purpose. The factory, the first in Wisconsin to undertake to make whey butter, has been so successful that last year it sold more than \$3,000 worth of whey butter. The increased price which the factory could pay its patrons for milk forced practically all the other large factories in that county to put in whey butter equipment, and most of the large Cheddar cheese factories of that State now make butter of this kind.—News.

The City Solicitor, Mr. Ryan, of Pittsburg, Pa., recently refused to accept \$60,000 fees for his services, claiming that his salary was fixed by ordinance at \$10,000 a year. He says his conscience would not allow him to accept more, and he turned the balance into the city treasury. What a pity Mr. Ryan could not be induced to pass through the atmosphere of some of the towns a little remote from his home. Gee, but it must be refreshing to see such a man, and see him alive!

## NEW OIL COMPANY LAUNCHED.

Concern Will Develop Holdings in Anse-la-Butte Field.

Thibodaux, La., Sept. 21.—An other oil charter has been filed at the court house in this parish. It is in a large measure identical with the Guidry Gas and Oil Co., that was recently organized here. The name of the new company is The Stark Oil Company, Incorporated, with a capital stock of \$30,000. The stock has a par value of \$10 a share.

The domicile of the company is in Thibodaux, but it is understood that the company will apply itself to the development of holdings in the Anse-la-Butte oil fields.

The board of directors and officers of the company are: President, Col. W. H. Price, of Thibodaux; vice president, Dr. F. R. Marrin, of Crowley; secretary and treasurer, J. C. Dupont, of Houma; Senator R. F. Broussard, of New Iberia; I. A. Broussard, of Lafayette; James Beary, of Thibodaux; Lee J. Forest, of Lakeport; L. B. Juilliat, of Thibodaux, and Congressman W. P. Martin, of Thibodaux. Among the other stockholders are Dr. Thos. Stark, of Thibodaux, and Anasta Patin, of St. Martinville.—Times-Picayune.
