The 1915 crops of this country have reached the good mark in both yield and value. The United States has been truly blessed with Peace and Plenty, while millions of the human race have been so sorely afflicted by the scourges of war. In this immediate section our people have been spared the horrors of war, but it seemed for a long while that all powers were combining to crush and impoverish every line of business in this fair section. Repeated crevasses and river floods carried disaster to broad areas around us; early frozes completed the disaster to the most promising crop the country had ever known.

These are the people who would have grimly borne, and would have illuminated their countenances and cheered the hearts and minds with the promises of the morrow, had not the Democratic party, flushed with recent successes, after an absence from power for two decades, launched upon us with the suddenness of a thunder bolt from a clear sky, a "free trade" experiment with our chief industry, as though bent upon rewarding the 40 years loyalty of the people to the Democratic party with complete and utter ruin. Mr. H. P. Gates has just concluded a long term lease with Mr. Carl Richter for the latter's property on the east bank of the Teche. There are 127 acres in the tract—formerly the Lourds tract, opposite the upper portion of this city. Mr. Gates will use this place as a dairy farm, where he will undertake to breed fine dairy cattle, and where he will raise poultry on an extensive scale. He proposes to clear and use every acre of the tract, and raise all of the feed used on the place.

Other transactions now pending, of which we have been requested to withhold mention of the names of principals until deals are completed, indicate a returning confidence and a promise of a reawakening of every line of trade.

**RETURNED TO LIFE.**  
 J. C. Price, Motorman, Severely Burned by an Electric Wire. Rescued by Paul Cordova.

Last Saturday evening at about 9 o'clock J. C. Price, motorman on the trolley line, had a very narrow escape from electrocution at the corner of Main and Corinne streets. He escaped with severe burns to his hands.

The car, which came up from Jeanerette, ran to the upper city limits and in being prepared for the return trip, the pulling down of the trolley which carried him up seems to have been forgotten. When the car neared Corinne street the forward trolley jumped the trolley wire and assumed a perpendicular position. Near Corinne street this upright trolley pole ran foul of another electric wire and pulled it down. The car was stopped by the motorman promptly, who got off the car to clear the trouble, whatever it might be. When he reached the ground he saw a wire hanging by the side of the car and extending from the roof of his car. He took hold of this wire and he was at once thrown to the ground, unconscious, his hands clinched upon the live wire.

Paul Cordova, night engineer at the New Iberia Electric Light Plant, was telephoned to and apprised of existing troubles; but at that moment it was not known that motorman Price had been entangled with the broken wire. Cordova, upon reaching the street from his engineering, saw the sparking wires were crossed at Corinne street, concluded to leave his post in charge of his fireman for a few minutes till he could run to the point of trouble, a block away, and possibly clear away the cross before more serious damage should result. Upon reaching the car he found Price was still entangled with the broken wire and no one dared touch him.

A hasty glance to the roof of the car revealed to him the nature of the crosses. He sprang to the rear end of the car and pulled down the back trolley-pole, thereby cutting off the trolley line circuit, and the 1200 volts of the trolley wire. Price's unconscious and rigid form was picked up and carried to the home of Post Master Silvio Broussard, where a more certain light could be had, and there laid upon the floor in the hall.

There it was found that Price was still as rigid as a bar of iron, his eyes set, his chest very much thrown forward, his tongue had been drawn towards the throat, and respiration was suspended. Cordova, appreciating that if there were a chance left for the saving of the life of Price, it must be availed of promptly, and accordingly he went to work upon the rigid form, applying the methods recommended for resuscitating a body overcome by an electric discharge. This prompt action on the part of Paul Cordova resulted in giving back to Jno. Price a new lease of life and restoring him to the bosom of his family, after being unconscious for fully a half hour or more.

Price's hands were pretty badly burned, but it is hoped that he will fully recover from this injury.
