GUSHER STILL YIELDS

300 Barrels Each Day.

Other Development Work Being Rushed in Lafayette.

Lafayette, La., Jan. 19.—The gusher brought in on the Beg sand tract at Anse-la-Butte Sunday night continues to produce about 300 barrels of oil a day. The well was drilled by McCann and Harper, of the Commonwealth Company, of which O. K. Porter, of Rome, Ga., is vice president and general manager. The well is 1519 feet deep.

McCann is also drilling a well on the Robert Martin tract. He has reached a depth of 2100 feet and reports that indications are very strong. He expects to drill to the depth of 3,500 feet if necessary.

The old Pioneer well is being drilled by Suttle and Company, of New Iberia. It is already 1,200 feet deep.

The Stark Company has erected a derrick on the Patin tract on the Lafayette and Breaux Bridge road and will soon begin to drill.

CHARTER OF HENSHAW BROS., INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia:

Be it known that on this Seventh day of December, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand, Nine Hundred and Fifteen, before me, William G. West, a Notary Public in and for Iberia Parish, Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, personally came and appeared Charles C. Henshaw and J. Robert Perry, both of Iberia Parish, Louisiana, Harold M. Henshaw, a resident of the Parish of Lafayette, Louisiana, and Nevil G. Henshaw of Charlottesville, Virginia, the said Nevil G. Henshaw herein appearing and acting through his agent, Charles C. Henshaw, under and by virtue of a general power of attorney of record in Miscellaneous Book No. 5, folio 239 of the Recorder's Office of Iberia Parish, Louisiana, who desired and said that, desiring to avail themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State with reference to the organization of corporations, they do hereby form themselves, their principals and such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, into a corporation and hereby adopt for the objects and purposes, and under the articles following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name and title of this corporation shall be "Henshaw Brothers" and under its said corporate name it shall have the power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, and same to break and alter at pleasure; to acquire, by purchase or otherwise, hold, receive, purchase, alienate, improve, sell, borrow on, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate under its corporate name, property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and managers or employees as may be desirable; to pre-empt their duties and to fix their compensation, if any; to make by-laws, rules and regulations for the management of its affairs; to conduct business in this State, other States, the Federal Districts, the Territories and possessions of the United States, and in foreign countries; to hold stock in other corporations, and to issue same for stock in other corporations; and to do all things necessary and proper or desirable to carry out the objects and purposes of the corporation. The said corporation, unless sooner dissolved under the provisions of this Charter, shall exist and continue for a period of fifty years.

ARTICLE II.
The domicile of this said corporation shall be in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana. The President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, of the corporation, shall be the person upon whom citation or other legal process may be served. But should legal process be served upon the corporation, in any manner permitted by law, the party receiving service must, hold same promptly to the knowledge of the President or, in his absence, of the Vice-President, and in the absence of both of said officers, shall take all steps necessary to secure corporate action in said proceedings.

ARTICLE III.
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, and the nature of the business to be engaged in by it, are declared to be the dealing in real estate and in corporate stocks and bonds; also in promissory notes, commercial paper and other kinds of personal property; and it shall have the right to acquire by purchase or
