THE NOMINEE OF THE PARTY.

We have received from an old subscriber, an active, earnest and life-long Democrat, the following question:

Ruston, La., January 20, 1916. To the Editor of The Times Picayune: I have been a constant subscriber to your good paper for more than fifteen years and have always considered it as our leading Democratic daily. From indications, I think that the perpetuity of the party in this state is threatened, and would like to know whether the paper will support the nominee of the party after the twenty first instant. I believe that this information is due your host of Democratic leaders in North and West Louisiana. Yours very truly,

We presume our enquirer means by "the nominee of the party," the Democratic candidate for governor to be chosen at next Tuesday's primary. If he does we answer, as our columns have already indicated, "No." We will not support the nominee at the head of the ticket whether he be Barret or Pleasant, because we do not believe that these gentlemen are advocating Democratic doctrines and ideals; do not believe that they represent—no matter how large a vote they may pole in the primary—the sentiments, aspirations and purposes of the Democratic voters of Louisiana, the rank and file of the people as distinguished from the organized officeholders and office seekers; because the election of either of these two candidates will not prove to the best interests of Louisiana in its present grave emergencies nor to that of the Democratic party of the state, whose "perpetuity" our correspondent rightly recognizes as "threatened" and endangered by the dissatisfaction existing within its ranks.

There are several candidates for lieutenant governor before the voters, any one of whom we can support and will support heartily. And the same is true of other candidates for state offices, but we cannot and will not support either Mr. Barret or Col. Pleasant for the reasons we have given—that they have shown no evidence of their desire, ability or intention to solve the serious problems facing Louisiana, on which hang the progress and prosperity of the state and the happiness of its people, nor any intention of building up the Democratic party and restoring political control where it belongs—with the Democratic voters. In fine, the campaign has proved that they are not Democrats, but opportunists, looking for votes and for offices for themselves and their more active supporters, and not at all careful whence they get them.

We have always stood for the Democratic party when standing for it meant something, but we cannot support candidates masquerading under false and misleading livery. We do not accept bogus Democratic labels but stand for Democratic principles, and that is more than the two candidates have stood for in the campaign. The voters have a righteous and increasing feeling of indignation that they have been trifled with and that what they need and have loudly demanded has been sacrificed to win the support of ringsters and spoolmen. These are some of the reasons why The Times Picayune cannot support the Democratic nominee for governor.

We speak out clearly and unequivocally on the subject because nothing of moment for the state and the Democracy can be accomplished by silence, and by pretending not to see what is clear and obvious to all.

Democracy is not an idle word to conjure off with; it means something—government by the people, not by the spoolmen, not by rings, cliques, combines and states. The party must be brought back to its teaching in order to win success; and in the long campaign they have conducted neither Mr. Barret nor Col. Pleasant has shown he is the man to lead and to do this. We cannot, therefore, and will not, support either for the high office of governor—N. O. Times-Picayune.
