BEST TO FEED CHICKS TESTED RATIIONS.

Conkey gives grain and mash
mixtures best for grow-
ing chicks.

MILK VERY GOOD.

If milk is not available, meat scrap in mash may be increased to fifteen pounds. Milk, however, is much preferred as the lactic acid has a beneficial effect on the digestive organs. Of course, dry buttermilk retains the full amount of lactic acid and in this convenient form makes a valuable addition to a mash. The grain is fed in the litter from the first and the mash is supplied in a suitable hopper when chicks are a week old. If it is desired to force the chicks rapidly, feed the mash moistened, once a day and give less of the cracked grains.

VARIETY OF FEEDS USED
After the chicks are a month old, gradually increase the animal matter, preferably a mixture of fish and beef scrap, to 15 per cent. For growing chicks, until they are about three months old, a variety of combinations in grains might be used. The following should be found satisfactory:

MASH
1 part Wheat Bran
1 part Corn Meal
1 part Middlings
1 part Beef Scrap

One pound of bone meal is added to every twelve pounds of mixture of mash. This is usually fed in a hopper. Give the mash moistened, once per day, if you desire to hasten the growth of the chick.

FEEDING BROILERS
Where chicks are raised for broilers they should be fed the same as other chicks for the first three weeks. Then the idea is to produce a plump carcass weighing from one and one half to two pounds as soon as possible. Heavy feeding is necessary and as this process does not have to be kept up for any length of time, the digestive organs can be taxed to the limit. At the beginning of the fourth week, a mash should be fed once per day and another mash feed added the fifth week. When five weeks old, three moderate mash feeds should be given each day, finishing up with a little grain scattered in the litter to induce exercise. Best results are obtained by feeding four or five times a day. When mash is not used, a mixture of whole or cracked grains, largely corn, as well as green food should be given. The last two weeks, the bulk of the feed should be mash.

A DIFFERENT MASH.
The mash that is fed broilers is different from that given ordinarily to chicks. A mixture of five parts corn meal, four parts wheat bran and six parts ground oats (without hulls) should give good results. If oats without hulls cannot be obtained, substitute middlings of about half the quantity. Oats with the hulls should never be used. In moistening the mash, never make this sloppy but merely crumbly.

ADD THESE TO THE MASH.
A little bone meal, ground charcoal, a small quantity of clean sand and a very little salt will be found excellent in the mash. Animal food should be given broilers and green food should be supplied daily. Broilers should not be allowed a free range or the use of large yards. However, do not keep them overcrowded as this will produce an unhealthy condition. Under favorable conditions, the broiler should be ready for the market in about eight to ten weeks.
