BOB'S DEMOCRACY.

Ex-Mayor and Ex Representative, Jules E. Dupuy, of this city, was a visitor to New Orleans last week and while there was interviewed. "The only Democratic paper in New Orleans" quotes him as saying "U. S. Senator Robert F. Broussard will be forced into the Republican party, where many Third District Democrats feel that he properly belongs."

The fact that Congressman Bob Broussard was a potent factor in the defeat of Mr. Dupuy's candidacy to succeed himself as Mayor of this city in 1905, could by no possibility or probability, lend color to Mr. Dupuy's classification of "Cousan Bob", the idol of his people.

We learn this week that certain gentlemen of this city were contemplating a card to the public, declaring that Mr. Dupuy was not authorized to speak for the Democrats of this parish. These "gentlemen" have been long accounted as Democrats, and are men of probity and high standing in the sphere of their acquaintance. Whether the card appears or not, it is strikingly certain that Senator Bob has for sixteen years represented the Democrats of the Third District, following which service, he has just entered upon his term as Senator from the Democratic State of Louisiana.

If it were in the power of any man to "force" Senator Broussard into any party, and he should be "forced" into the Progressive party, the "forcer" will accomplish more for the permanency of the new party than has been accomplished by the President through his failure to remember and observe his campaign pledges to this state. The Progressives would gladly vote Mr. Dupuy a loving cup for his services, if he only could deliver the goods to the Progressive party.

IBERIA'S DELEGATION.

New Orleans, La., April 29, '16. To the Editor of The Times-Picayune:

I have read the interview of Jules E. Dupuy, reproduced in the New Orleans press, relative to the delegation appointed by the Democratic parish executive committee. I must dissent from his conclusions as to the extent of the delegation. I concede to Mr. Dupuy the right to speak his opinion in any and all matters, but I deny him the right to speak for me or for the delegation as a whole.

When the Democratic executive committee met, it resolved unanimously that the committee should elect an unattached delegation, provide the unit rule and eliminate proxies. The committee then elected twenty delegates to cast the thirteen votes of Iberia parish under the unit rule. All of the elected delegates are prominent and well known true and tried Democrats whose fealty to Democratic principles is unquestioned, but are men who do their own thinking, are independent of thought, follow no one, but act always in common accord with the majority in their councils.

Knowing every one of them, I feel I can safely say that they will go to Baton Rouge on May 23, 1916, thoroughly representing the Democracy of Iberia parish, try to elect to the national convention true and tried Democrats and a national committeeman who by his past services and devotion to the party merits and deserves the support of the Iberia delegation.

I do not believe it the intention of the parish executive committee to appoint a delegation for the purpose of seeking vengeance on any one of punishing any one and reading out or ousting from the Democratic party any one. I consider that the paramount duty of the delegation is to assist in promoting the interest and welfare of the Democratic party and not to seek a quarrel with any one. A. J.
