AROUND THE WORLD.

Minnesota has adopted a high liquor law making \$500 the penalty. The estimates for the British navy for 1886, are nearly sixty millions.

The legality of the Iowa liquor law is being tested before the United States Court.

Senator Lamar is looming up for a Cabinet position, but is not definitely located yet.

The Poor House at Berne, Switzerland, burned on the 23d, and six persons were consumed.

Gen. De Lisle has now 18,000 troops, and thinks with such a force he can easily rid Tonquin of the enemy.

The women and children at the fall of Kartoum were spared, but Gen. Gordon and the regular soldiers were killed.

A train on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, jumped the track on the 23d, near Des Moines, and several persons were crippled.

The last of the cases in Missouri against the notorious train robber Frank James, have been dismissed, but he is wanted in the other States.

Wm. Haven, an old man aged 80 years, was murdered near Knoxville lately, and the author of the crime is thought to have been his own son.

Olivier Pain who is the right bower of El Mahdi in all his movements in the Soudan, is a Frenchman by birth, and has seen an eventful life.

It is thought that an extra session of Congress will be inevitable as so many important measures will have been neglected by the outgoing one.

The schooner T. J. Collins from Galveston to Boston, loaded with cotton and iron was burned a few days since. The crew escaped, but the vessel and cargo are a total loss.

Negotiations for the Irish vote are said to be actively going on between the Government and Parnell. It will be interesting to know what sop is to be flung to Cerberus.—States.

The subsidy scheme to give \$600,000 for carrying foreign mails is likely to come to grief. The Senate supported the bill by a large majority, but the lower house couldn't see any merit in it.

The Grand Army of the Republic now in session at San Francisco, have sent a petition to Congress praying for the immediate passage of an act placing Gen. Grant on the retired list.

The new nervous disease with which fashionable women are troubled, is being ascribed to an over indulgence in tea, but when the men are similarly afflicted, it is said to be the result of an over indulgence in intoxicants.

Three attempts were lately made at Exeter, England, to hang a man named Lee for the murder of an old lady, but each attempt was a failure, and the affair had to be postponed until the hangman had learned his business better.

The venerable statesman Gladstone it seems, will soon have to retire from the premiership. His great age coupled with the unfortunate result of the Egyptian campaign, and other complications in European diplomacy, have rendered the step necessary.

The Legislature of Minnesota has adopted a new penal code similar to that of New York. Hanging is the penalty in the first degree. By the old code the death sentence was left to the option of the judge, who in no instance ever exercised the privilege.

The glove match at Toronto, between Charley Mitchel and Jack Scholes, resulted in favor of Mitchel. In a similar affair at New York, between William Springhall of England, and Joe. Dunning of Brooklyn, the latter came out a bad second best.

Gen. Horace E. Capron, who commanded the company that assisted at the laying of the corner stone of the Washington monument in 1848, died Sunday night 22d, from the effects of a cold contracted Saturday the 21st, while attending the ceremonies of dedication on that day.

The Boston Herald well says: "The company of Iowa tourists through the South, who repaid the courtesy of a friendly welcome by the people of a Georgia town, by singing an offensive song of the war time, showed the need of a reconstruction in their own manners."

STATE ITEMS.

There was a heavy sleet fall at Alexandria last Friday night and Saturday.

The receipts at the gates of the Exposition for the week ending Feb. 22d, were \$47,699.25.

Mrs. Marguerite Bourgeois, wife of Mr. B. Abadie of New Orleans, died at Covington, suddenly Feb. 23d.

The jury in the Ford-Murphy case was completed on the 24th, and after a recess, the Court began to examine witnesses.

The Baltimore and Ohio Telegraph Line between New Orleans and Houston, is now completed and will soon be in operation.

The Board of Administrators of the State Normal School, at Natchitoches, have decided to open the school for students March 1st.

Capt. William M. Pavy, inspector of construction in the employ of the United States' Engineer Corps, died suddenly in New Orleans.

Mr. Lionel C. Levy of New Orleans, was accidentally killed by the discharge of his gun, while hunting near Covington on Sunday last.

The Director *pro tem* Buck has called upon the Mayor for a list of the Orphan Asylums, in order that he may extend invitations to all the inmates to visit the Exposition.

The fine building known as the Banking House of the Land & Timber Company of Calcasieu, of which Mr. J. B. Watkins was President, was destroyed by fire on the 22d.

The jury chosen to try the Murphy murderers in their second trial is thought to be a good one and the public may reasonably look for a verdict in accordance with the law and the evidence.

On the evening of the 24th, a difficulty occurred in New Orleans, between James Grady and James Garens, resulting in the shooting of Garens by Grady. The wound is probably a mortal one.

Mr. Dalzin Herpin, of Lafayette, was assassinated in bed on the night of the 22d. No clue are given as to who the murderers were.

Commissioner C. J. Barrow, Louisiana's Representative at the Exposition, has notified Gov. McEnery that the State Exhibit is complete and arranged.

The markets are not well supplied with new vegetables at present. Lettuce is scarce at 10 cents a head, tomatoes are five for a dime, cucumbers from five to 25 cents each, and there are no new potatoes.—N. O. Pic.

Thomas Pickett who killed Wm. Buckley in 1875 and escaped, and was captured at St. Louis and sent to the penitentiary in 1877, for life, during the late fire at that institution, made his escape and is now at large.

It must be very evident to our people that protection against overflow must depend mainly on themselves. The people look to the Board of Engineers to protect them against the contractors.—New Orleans Picayune.

The City Item goes in for crushing out the gambling power in New Orleans, and as the permits to run gambling halls only yield a revenue of \$6000, it proposes that sixty gentlemen of means pay \$100 each, and offers to head the list with that amount.

Dog fights are one of the innocent amusements of the good people of New Orleans now, and the papers are kicking up a fuss about it. Why not break up the fights of the two legged animals who are supposed to have more sense than their four legged consins.

An Apirian Congress was held at the Agricultural Hall in the Exposition buildings on the 24th, to form an international bee keepers association. Representatives from all the societies in the United States, Canada and Cuba were present, and took part in the deliberations.

Harvey's Canal and Bayou Barataria, have been renowned for their piscatory treasures and the ease with which they could be gathered, but this winter the amount and variety of the fish are astonishing. Trout, sacalet, perch and the striped bars—as we are told by the Times-Democrat, are caught in quantities.

A car load of railroad magnates will soon pass here en route to New Orleans. Among the notables, will be Senator Leland Stanford, president Central Pacific; Col. Charles Crocker, vice-president Southern Pacific; Col. T. W. Pierce, president Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio, and it is thought their purpose is to merge the Morgan road into the Sunset system.

Judge Adolphe Garigues died suddenly at Opelousas last Wednesday morning, aged 77 years. Judge Garigues has held official positions in St. Landry for thirty-five years, such as clerk of court, recorder and parish judge. He was appointed tax collector of St. Landry by Gov. Nicholls under the Nicholls administration. When the Constitution of 1879 made the sheriff tax collector, Sheriff Duson retained Judge Garigues as his collector, which position he held up to the moment of his death. He leaves a widow and a large family of children, all married.
