STATE ITEMS.

None of the escaped parish prison convicts have yet been captured in New Orleans.

A German cabinet-maker named Doemer, suicided in New Orleans Sunday, by taking a dose of morphine.

Mr. O. O. West has removed his horses back to Louisville, where his famous horse Tom Martin is being trained.

Monday was a great day at the Exposition, it being Germany's Day, and at the same time the fete of the Emperor William.

Avoyelles is having her turn at epidemic measles, of the black variety. Rayville is the seat of a good deal of sickness just now.

A negro named Ringo, killed another named Baton, in Madison parish, by slicing him up into Fee-fee Island steaks, with a razor.

The great pulpit orator, Mgr. Capel, of England, delivered a lecture at St. Patrick's church, New Orleans, on Sunday night, to a large audience.

Bishop H. N. McTyere, D. D., of Nashville, preached at the Methodist Episcopal Church South, on Felicite street, New Orleans, on Sunday last.

The lecture of the Hon. Chs. Gayarre, at the Union Francaise Sunday afternoon was a great success, the building being packed with the elite of the city.

The eloping pair Miss Mary Reid of New Orleans, and Mr. Leou J. Christmas of McComb city, were married in Vicksburg Sunday, by squire L. M. Loewenberg.

John Duffy of New Orleans, and Frank Stark of Iowa, had a "mill" in New Orleans on Sunday afternoon, and the former light weight used up the latter in three rounds.

Gov. McDaniel of Georgia, with a detachment of State troops, arrived in New Orleans on Sunday. In addition to the troops he is accompanied by his staff and many ladies and gentlemen.

The Iberville South forms a high opinion of the prospects for a rice crop in that parish, from the number of flumes opened, but it does not allude to the prospect for a good crop of crevasses.

There is no clue as yet, to the murder of Bridget Derby, on Friday night in New Orleans. Three or four parties are under surveillance, but it remains to be seen whether a clue can be obtained sufficient to warrant an arrest.

It is interesting to know how hard it is for a man to kill his brother man in the first degree. That fine art murder which DeQuincy wrote about, is fast becoming one of the lost arts. A queer thing about it, is that the richer or more educated the man, the harder it is for him to commit more than manslaughter.—States.

On Tuesday, a young married couple arrived in the city and proceeded at once to the Exposition. Soon after entering the lady was taken ill, and being carried to a room was, through the aid of a physician, relieved from the pangs of a premature parturition, after which she was removed on a stretcher to quarters in the city.

A well dressed negro calling himself the Rev. A. W. Johnson, was shot in the head and fatally wounded in New Orleans, just before day Tuesday morning, by officer George T. Creagh. The negro was in the alley-way of Mr. Geison, and when arrest was attempted, clubbed the officer, who in self defense as he alleges fired the fatal shot.

The decorticating and debiberizing machine now on exhibition at the Exposition, is attracting much attention from Southern agriculturists, who are casting longing looks in the direction of Ramee, as the new staple that is to bring them out of the wilderness of their troubles.

Street car smokers have been appealed to time and again by the New Orleans papers, to discontinue the nuisance while in the cars, and especially when ladies are present, but they still continue to puff away all the same. A healthy fine would soon bring them to an observance of the decencies of social life.

The City Item has coined a new word to designate the offspring of the white and black race, designating them as *negroids*. The English is a copious language already, and having an exhaustless supply of roots imbedded in other tongues living and dead, admits of any amount of derivatives and new coinages.

AROUND THE WORLD.

The slave women of Kartoum are being sold around Korti at \$100 apiece.

Mrs. Tom Thumb is to be married on Easter Monday to Count Moyri, in New York.

One hundred ladies and gentlemen will leave Baltimore March 31, for the Exposition.

At Laredo one Rosalio Legerio beat Eulalie Jasnard Emanuel Oleni into a pulp with a club.

A wretch across the Rio Grande lately cut the flesh from his wife's body and forced her to eat it.

Gen. Geo. A. Gray of Delaware has been nominated for Senator from that State to succeed Bayard.

The leading men in the Korean revolt were hung, and their fathers, mothers, wives and children shared the same fate.

The British are mobilizing an army corps at Calcutta of about 25,000 men to be sent to Qeneta and Alahadra.

Mrs. Sallie Monton of Smithville, Va., died suddenly of heart disease in a sleeper while en route to New Orleans on Sunday.

We have in the United States fifty penitentiaries with 50,000 convicts in them, and the cost of the buildings was \$500,000,000.

Congressman J. D. Richardson of Tennessee stands seven feet in his socks and will be able to look over the heads of all his compeers.

City Marshal Gildart of Greenville, Miss., recently shot and killed a desperado named Powell, who rifle in hand refused to surrender.

A woman named Eliza Taylor and her brother Tom Jones, were lately lynched by a body of 200 men in Nebraska for inducing the woman's sons to murder a neighboring homesteader, Robert Roberts.

Prof. Edward Emerson Barnard of Tennessee is only 28 years old. He is now resident astronomer at the Vanderbilt University in that State.

Miss Annie Van Vechter is the last mentioned young lady who is to marry President Cleveland. She is now on a visit to his sister at the White House.

At Decatur, Texas, Miss Mollie Hart attempted to shoot W. A. Pool a mattress makers. The girl alleged ravishing by Pool in the absence of her mother.

David Woodruff worked his passage to California thirty years ago and returns to New Haven, his old home, a bank president and worth \$2,000,000.

The new English powder, the "cocoa," is said to have a pressure of sixteen and a half tons to the square inch, and a velocity of 2010 feet per second.

Frank Henderson, a negro aged 85 years lately died in Alabama. He was the youngest of seventeen children and the mother still survives at the age of 123.

The law library of Charles O'Connor, the renowned New York lawyer, has been sold, with the exception of the collection left to the New York Law Institute.

The county officers of Habersham, Ga., have been arrested for complicity in robbing the safe. One Ben Martin confesses to the crime and implicates the officials.

Wisconsin has no marriage license laws and when a young couple are anxious to be spliced, they rush for that indulgent State to "sin in haste and repent at leisure."

The old Tammany chief, John Kelly, is spoken of a good deal for the Collectorship of the Port of New York. He was a stout opponent of Cleveland's nomination.

The Langhan Hotel at Chicago burned Saturday night and it is believed that at least five persons perished in the flames and a number were more or less injured.

Our national debt during nineteen years has been lessened \$1,350,071,892.5. On August 31st, 1865, the interest amounted to \$151,832,051 and now it is about \$18,000,000.

The warship Colorado, once the pride of the American navy and the admiration of seamen the world over, is now a worthless old hulk and is being dismantled at N. Y.

The British, under Gen. McNeal, seven miles from Suakim, have been surprised by the Arabs, losing 53 killed and 85 wounded. It is estimated that over a thousand of the Arabs were killed and wounded.

Col. F. E. Whitfield, one of Mississippi's most distinguished men, and next to Lamar her greatest orator, died almost instantly at Jacksonville, Fla., of heart disease, just after singing a song in a party of ladies and gentlemen.

Justice Bradley of the Supreme Court seems to have a rather poor opinion of the average lawyer that appears before that august tribunal. He thinks there is too much wind work and sound and too little law brought into requisition.

In Crawford county, Ga., Mrs. McInsole has been murdered as is supposed by her young husband. She was sixty years old and he twenty-five. He is believed to have hurried matters to get the five or six thousand dollars the old lady was possessed of.
