STATE ITEMS.

The receipts at the Exposition on Thursday, amounted to \$3,706 50.

Five thousand school children, will visit the Exposition, in New Orleans to day, by an invitation of the Management.

Robert Gross, committed to the Parish Prison of New Orleans, to be examined for insanity suicided by holding his head in a barrel of water.

The assessment rolls for New Orleans will show it is said \$150,000,000, and the city's alimony over the present budget \$380,000, which sum will help to put things in good order.

S. K. Russ, a well known produce dealer living at the corner of Coliseum and Milan streets, New Orleans, suicided Thursday night. Cause supposed to be unfortunate speculations.

An invitation has been extended by Gov. McEnery to the governors of all the States and Territories formed from the original territory of Louisiana, to visit the Exposition on Louisiana day.

Sampson Roland, who murdered Ben. Gertzdorf last February, in Ascension parish, and who was shot for resisting arrest at Pointe Coupee, has been turned over to Dept. Sheriff Israel of Ascension.

The Grand Jury of St. Mary, have made a report which shows the parish to be in a good financial condition, and crime on the decline. It reports \$5360 in the parish fund, and \$1019 in road funds.

There was a baby show in New Orleans, on Wednesday last. It may be all right to make such displays of infants, and suit the tastes of some folks, but we are not of the number who admire the thing.

A stay of execution has been granted by Gov. McEnery in the cases of William and Perry Milton, sentenced to be hanged last Friday, for the murder of a man named Cherry, in the parish of Union.

A disease resembling glanders, is prevailing in a virulent form at the Hermitage plantation, in Ascension parish. It so far baffles the skill of veterinarians. Nine animals have died and 18 are under treatment.

A man named Brooks Kaufman, was crushed to death on the steamer Danube, Friday last, by being caught between a chain brace and a barrel of oil, the boat having struck a snag, which forced on one side several balls of cotton against the barrel.

The River Convention which was in session for two days last week and adjourned last Thursday, was an earnest body and composed of men of the highest intelligence. They passed a set of resolutions ably setting forth their views upon the needs of the Southwest as regards the water highways of their section, and what they deemed should be the action of the Government in regard thereto. Their opinions as expressed in the resolutions will carry great weight, and do much good for the cause.

Gov. McEnery will be requested by the Louisiana State Board of Health, to issue his proclamation for the quarantine to go into effect on May 1st. All ports, Jamaica excepted, embraced in the precautionary measures of last year will take effect this season.

L. James, of New Orleans a widower with three children, married a widow with four children some one year and a half ago, but their married relations were not happy. He attempted suicide some months ago, but failed in the attempt. Thursday last he attempted twice to shoot his wife, but the pistol failed to go off, and his wife running out of his reach, he blew his own brains out.

Prof. Rasper Sabpon Wells, the greatest balloon builder and aeronaut in the world, will soon have ready a monster balloon which will ascend from the Exposition grounds twice a week until its close. Mrs. Sarah Furman Wells the author of the greatest historical book of travels ever published, will also make some ascents. Professor Wells will also arrange captive balloon ascents. He has made 500 balloon ascents. He constructed immense balloons for both France and Germany, during their war in 1870.

AROUND THE WORLD.

Bismarck thinks there will be no war between Britain and Russia, and what he thinks is seldom wide of the mark.

A V. Arnold, a wealthy lumber merchant of Wilkesburg, Pa., suicided by shooting himself through the heart last Friday.

The Sultan of Turkey has had issued a proclamation, denouncing El Mahdi as a promoter of sedition and an enemy to the true faith, an imposter and robber.

The Indians now in rebellion in the northwest of Canada, have massacred a number of citizens at Frog Lake. The Rebels number over a thousand men.

The likelihood of a war between Britain and Russia, has given breadstuffs an upward tendency, and wheat has advanced rapidly at the great grain centers.

Chas. Poofert, of San Antonio, Tex., has recovered the sum of \$16,666 from the Sunset Railroad for injuries received some two years ago while crossing the track with a wagon near Medina.

The war party in Russia is said to be getting the upper hand, and if hostilities began between Britain and Russia, the latter power will open the campaign with ten army corps of 50,000 men each.

It is now said that the physicians have been pandering to sentiment, and eking out the life of Gen. Grant several days, in order to have him ready for Abraham's bosom last Friday the 9th, it being the anniversary of the surrender of Lee at Appomatox Court House. This is all bosh to sensible people.

The news of the death of Barrios and the routing of his army, has been confirmed. His son Don Vinando was also slain in the battle, which was a sanguinary one.

Edward Lambert, of Chicago, who had been separated from his wife, the other day called to see her, and while there shot and killed her mother, wounded his wife severely, and then killed himself.

The celebrated shot Dr. Carver, was defeated a few days since at San Antonio, by Penrose. Out of 100 birds turned loose, Penrose killed 90, and out the same number Dr. Carver killed 81.

The case of Robert Ireland, a naturalized citizen of this country, and who was decoyed into Canada, he being a deserter from the British army—is being investigated by our government.

A lunatic L. K. Eldrige, at the Nashville Asylum, on Wednesday last, seized a mop and crushed the skulls of two men, E. B. Buchanan, an attendant at the ward, and T. C. Layton, an epileptic patient.

Grant still continues to live despite the anxiety sensation managers, who would gladly see him kick the bucket just by way of giving a little variety to their daily bulletins in regard to his situation.

Paddy Ryan and J. L. Sullivan have at last fixed up matters to have a fight with gloves for \$2500 aside, but no place have as yet been pitched upon, and the laws in most States are opposed to such brutal exhibitions.

The Republican members of the Tennessee legislature are concealed in the Maxwell House, and a guard is kept round the premises. It was at first designed to starve them out, but fool was at last accounts sent in to them.

Cyrus W. Field, so extensively known in this country in connection with railroads and submarine cables, has retired from business, having salted down enough of the needful to do him for the remaining years of his life.

Mississippi was visited last week by one of the most disastrous rain storms known for many years. In twelve hours there fell the almost unprecedented quantity of four and one-third inches of water. The winds played havoc with railroads and telegraph wires.

There is a report derived from private sources that a plot had been laid to assassinate Gov. Hoadley, of Ohio. He received a suspicious box with a string attached and had it been pulled, there would have been an explosion. It was opened and found to contain dynamite.

The Illinois Legislature is still fooling away time, pretending to try and elect a U. S. Senator. If the members are spending their own money, there is no great harm done, but if they are spending that of the people, they ought to have a Guy Fawes' Magazine of powder under them and some one ought to put a short fuse to it with fire at one end.
