Surely every one who can possibly spare the time and the money will not neglect an opportunity which in all human probability will not be again offered them, to see and learn so much. Let Louisiana Day be the grandest turn out of the season.

The Cholera.

The press of the country are calling the attention of the authorities to the danger of a visitation from that most terrible of all scourges, the Asiatic cholera, during the coming summer. It is said to be even now in Spain, and if such is the case it will require almost superhuman efforts to prevent its spread to America. No disease to which the human system is liable, is so destructive of life or is capable of creating such a panic throughout communities. Most other diseases where one has recovered from the attack afford an acclimation amounting to total or partial immunity from a second visitation, but there is no exemption in the case of cholera. We may have it a dozen times if exposed to an attack as easily as once. The utmost attention to cleanliness and diet, although lessening the danger of an attack does not afford entire immunity. Every effort should be made to prevent it from crossing the ocean, and while doing that our towns and cities should exert themselves in carrying out all the sanitary reforms possible under the circumstances. Let but one case reach some large city with an atmosphere suited to the development of the disease and there will be no stamping it out afterwards. It would speed over this country with the spread of a prairie on fire, only to die out when the material to feed it was exhausted. If ever the trite old axiom that "an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure" had any force in application, it surely is so in the matter of keeping the cholera away if possible, and if it must come, of being prepared to limit as much as possible the number of subjects it may claim. The yellow fever is restricted to certain districts by climatic laws, but the fell destroyer cholera, is

no respecter of persons or zones. The palace or the hovel, the pole or the equator, alike furnish the victims for its insatiate maw.
