STATE ITEMS.

It is now generally conceded that Mr. Montegut has been appointed to succeed Mr. Smythe in the management of the New Orleans mint.

John Carey, a noted hoodlum of New Orleans, shot and dangerously wounded officer Thomas Healey on the night of the 6th, while under arrest.

From the numerous accounts of murders the telegraph brings us, it would seem that killing is becoming a recognized industry, says the Shreveport Times.

Ex Senator B. F. Jonas has received the official notification of his appointment to the Collectorship of the Port of New Orleans. It has fallen into good hands.

The 4th was ushered in and celebrated with great display of patriotism by the citizens of Abbeville. The stars and stripes of the United States and the tri-colors of France floated gallantly in the breeze.

At the last meeting of the Police Jury of St. Martin, Sheriff T. J. Broussard made his final settlement with the parish for the year 1884, showing a very close collection, for which he was highly complimented.

They are pushing forward the erection of electric towers to light up the rear portion of the city of New Orleans. It requires about one and a half days to raise one and the cost is \$850. They are 125 feet high.

At the opening of the Supreme Court in Opelousas on the 6th, Chief Justice Bermudez was the only Judge on the bench. Justices Poche and Todd were unwell, and Justices Fenner and Manning arrived in the evening.

The railroads are showing fight in Rapides parish over the assessments made on their property. The average value at which they are rated is about \$6000 per mile, which does not seem excessive. The roads are not disposed to pay and the Police Jury will not consent to a reduction. The lawyers of course will fatten on the broil.

The more the tangled net of Sheriff Powell's rascalities in East Carroll parish is straightened out the more are the people astonished at their enormity, and the apparent ease with which he accomplished them and made good his escape from justice. He has been heard from in a western city, but is perhaps now in the rogues asylum in Canada. The amount of his defalcation is placed at \$30,000.

There died at Natchitoches, on July the 2d, T. S. Moise, who was the father of several sons, all men of much promise in their various callings in this State. Mr. Moise was wedded to a Miss Vaughn of Natchitoches, he being a native of South Carolina. His profession was that of a painter, and in it he had no superior and few equals in the South. He was not only a painter, but a wit and a scholar, and his works of art place him in the front rank of men of his profession. He had reached the ripe age of 77 when he died.

Capt. Emile A. Carmouche, a well known planter residing near Shreveport died at Little Rock, Ark., on the 7th. He was one of the prisoners on the steamer Maple Leaf and on his way to a Northern prison, when he and his companions rose on the crew and captured the vessel. They then ran her ashore and made their escape into the Confederacy.

The 14th of July will be observed as a great Fete by our fellow-citizens of French birth, in New Orleans and indeed throughout the country. The celebration will take place at West End under the management of the Committee of Thirty from the Union Française, and the Consul of the French Republic, Vicomte Paul d'Abzac, will be the Honorary President of the ceremonies. It will be a brilliant affair and all should attend who can.

AROUND THE WORLD.

Lowry seems to have the inside track for the nomination for Governor of Mississippi.

The convention with Russia was already prepared when Mr. Gladstone resigned, and it only remains to be signed by Lord Salisbury.

Mr. Matthew Arnold, gives it as his opinion that Mrs. Josephine Arnold, wife of ex-Senator Arnold, is the most beautiful woman in the world.

The French are again in trouble in Tonquin. The garrison of Hue made a sudden and unexpected attack upon Gen. Courcy, the night of his arrival at that place.

Gov. Warren, of Wyoming Territory, endorses woman suffrage, in the following flattering terms: "Women consider much more carefully than men the character of the candidates, and both political parties have found themselves obliged to nominate their best men in order to obtain the support of the women." This is practical reform.

The Ameer of Afghanistan is said to be marching troops on the frontier, and Russia is not less active.

The Bank of England and nearly all the public buildings of London are supplied with water from Artesian wells, and the most of the water of Paris is obtained the same way.

There was a most unprecedented fall of rain in the neighborhood of Dallas, on the evening of the 5th. The fall was over five inches in two hours. The railroads as usual, were more or less damaged.

The courts of Pennsylvania have decided that a religious organization cannot hold property unless its principles are made definitely known. This is a move against loose theology. Rigid creeds will now be in order.—Shreveport Times.

Felix Williams and Perry Christian, who last fall murdered an old peddler at Grenada, Miss., were the other day taken, one from the Sheriff and the other from the jail, by 150 men and lynched by them.

Edward Finch, aged 75, his sister aged 80, both white, and a negro boy aged 15, were murdered near Moncure, N. C., Saturday night last. They were knocked in the head with an ax. One of the fiends has been arrested.

The trouble with the cattle men whose herds are quarantined on their way to the West is not yet over, but the Attorney General has decided that they have the right to use the tail. There will probably be some killing done before the matter is settled.

It is said that the time is not "far distant when the American rancher will have to take his cattle, or part of them, into Mexico." A few hundred thousand might, in the meantime, be well pastured in Cameron, Calcasieu, St. Landry and other parishes of Louisiana.

Joseph Macklin, who was convicted of perjury in the Chicago election frauds, has been refused a new trial, and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. He has been fighting hard to avoid the striped jacket, but it seems he will have to don it *volens volens*.

There is a project on foot in Santa Fe, for calling a mass meeting favoring the purchase by this Government of the four northern States of Mexico. It is being engineered by over one hundred leading Mexicans and Americans. The States to be bought are Chihuahua, Sonora, Durango and Coahuila.

Great excitement has been aroused in London, by the Pall Mall Gazette publishing a history of a secret inquiry into vices practiced in London by men of wealth and high social standing. The article gives horrible details of the violation of maidens of tender years, and of a traffic in such crimes regularly carried on between London and other large cities.
