

ACT OF INCORPORATION. OF THE ATAKAPAS CLUB.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. I, the undersigned Deputy Clerk of Court and ex-officio Recorder in and for the Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, do hereby certify that the above and foregoing is a true and correct copy from and of the original act of incorporation of the Atakapas Club, duly filed on the 20th day of March, A. OFFICIAL. AN ORDINANCE. To put into effective operation Articles 291, 292, 293, and 294 of the Constitution of the State, to divide the Parish of Iberia into road districts, to raise funds for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and repairing the public roads and bridges of the Parish, and to provide for the enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be "THE ATAKAPAS CLUB" and its domicile shall be in the Town of New Iberia, Louisiana. Under its said corporate name it shall have the power to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal and the same to break or alter at pleasure, to hold, receive, lease, purchase and convey under its corporate name property, real and personal; to name and appoint such officers and agents as the interests and convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of the affairs of said corporation as may be necessary and proper and the same to change and alter at pleasure, and to do all such acts and things as are or may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation; and said corporation unless sooner dissolved under the provisions of this charter or by authority of law shall exist for twenty-five years from the day of its incorporation in compliance with the law; all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the President of said corporation, or in his absence or inability upon the Vice-President thereof or in case of the absence or inability of the Vice-President upon the Secretary.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be those usual to a Board of Trade; the advancement of the commercial interests of the Parish of Iberia; the establishment in New Iberia, of a Club Room, a library and reading room for the literary improvement of its members and the cultivation of friendly and social intercourse and for carrying out of the objects and purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE III. The corporate powers of this Association and the management of its affairs shall be vested in and exercised by nine members composing the Board of Government, said Board to consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and five other members elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the members of this corporation to be held on the third Tuesday of June of each year, by a majority of the members necessary to form a quorum as hereinafter established. Messrs. A. Dalgre, W. F. Dunbar, Phillip Lee, J. E. Dupuy, C. C. Kramer, James Gebert, H. P. Ortmeyer, A. J. Maumus and A. B. Murray have been chosen and selected to compose the first Board of Government of the said A. Dalgre as President, the said W. F. Dunbar as Vice-President, the said Phillip Lee as Secretary and the said J. E. Dupuy as Treasurer to serve until the annual meeting of the members of this corporation to be held on the third Tuesday of June, 1900, and until their successors are elected and installed.

ARTICLE IV. Special meetings of the members of this corporation may be called by the President, or in his absence by any one of the officers named in Article third of this Charter in the order of their naming at their own discretion, but they shall do so upon the written request of five members.

ARTICLE V. A quorum for the ordinary transaction of business shall consist of fifteen of the members of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI. No member of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the amount of his indebtedness to the Association; nor shall any member informally in organization have the effect of rendering this act null, or of expelling a shareholder in any liability beyond the amount of his said indebtedness.

ARTICLE VII. This act of incorporation may be altered, amended and modified by a vote of a majority of all the members of the Association at a special meeting called for that purpose. This act passed at my office in the Town of New Iberia, Parish and State aforesaid on the day, month and year first above written in the presence of Messrs. Sterling W. Peebles and John E. Schwinger, good and competent witnesses residing in the parish who have signed these presents with the parties and me, Notary, after due reading of the whole. A. DAIKRE, Notary Public.

Section 1. Be it further ordained, etc. That there is hereby imposed and levied an annual per capita tax of One Dollar, for the calendar year 1900, and for each succeeding calendar year, upon each able-bodied male inhabitant of the Parish of Iberia, between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-five (55) years, except expressly exempted by such tax by Article 291 of the Constitution; which said tax shall be collected in the calendar year of 1900, and in each subsequent calendar year, by the tax collector of the Parish of Iberia, and shall be paid on or before the thirty-first (31) day of December in each respective year, or to said tax collector, and whosoever shall refuse, neglect or fail to pay the said per capita tax on or before the thirty-first (31) day of December of each year, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject himself to a criminal prosecution in the courts of this State and under the laws governing criminal prosecutions and trials, and upon trial and conviction before a court of competent jurisdiction he shall be fined a sum of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) or imprisoned in the Parish Jail for not more than five nor more than thirty days, or both at the discretion of the court.

A Second Call on Behalf of the Trust Made President.

Washington, D. C., April 9.—The enormous campaign fund the Republican party expects to collect to re-elect President McKinley amounts to \$6,200,000.

A letter, carefully prepared at a conference between Senator Hanna and the moneyed members of the Republican National Committee, has been sent out by that organization.

This letter calls attention to the profits the least manufacturers have been able to secure under Republican rule, and says that to enjoy them in the future the re-election of President McKinley is absolutely necessary.

This letter has gone only to the richest trusts, but the smaller ones will be squeezed later. These contributions are expected: Carnegie, the Federal Steel Company, and the other members of the Steel and Iron Trust, \$1,500,000.

- From the Standard Oil Company, \$800,000. From the Shipbuilding Trust, \$500,000. From the Sugar Trust, \$500,000. From the Tobacco Trust, \$450,000. From the Paper Trust, \$300,000. From the Cracker Trust, \$150,000. From the American Wool Company, \$150,000. From the American Lead Company, \$200,000. From half a dozen smaller trusts and highly "protected" industries, \$1,750,000. Total, \$6,200,000.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Bushman Kop, March 31.—The British forces, commanded by Col. Broadwood, consisting of the 10th Hussars and two horse batteries, and a force of mounted infantry under Col. Pilcher, which had been garrisoning Thaba Nchu, was obliged, in consequence of the near approach of a large force of Boers, to leave last night.

The convoy arrived at a deep spruit, twenty miles from Bloemfontein, where the Boers were concealed, and the entire party walked into ambush and was captured, together with six guns.

The loss of life was not great, since most of the British had walked into the trap before a shot was fired.

London, April 6.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts:

Methuen telegraphs from Boerhof (in the Orange Free State, a little northeast of Kimberley,) as follows:

"Surrounded General Villebois Mareuil and a body of Boers today. None escaped. Villebois and seven Boers killed, eight wounded; fifty prisoners."

General De Villebois Mareuil was the chief of staff of the Boer army. He was about fifty years old, and is said to have been responsible for many of the Boer successes in Natal and later in Cape Colony and the southern part of the Orange Free State. It is said that he entered the Boer service merely because war was his trade. He went through a number of campaigns in the French army.

London, April 6, 4:09 P. M.—The following is the text of Lord Roberts' dispatch to the War Office, announcing the capture of five companies of his troops:

Bloemfontein, April 15.—Another unfortunate occurrence has occurred resulting, I fear, in the capture of a party of infantry consisting of three companies of the Royal Irish Fusiliers, and two companies of the Ninth Regiment of mounted infantry, near Reddersburg, a little eastward of Bethany railway station, within a few miles of this place. They were surrounded by a stronger force of the enemy with four or five guns.

Fourteen Brave Women Fight to Death.

New York, April 6.—A correspondent of the World, writing from Pretoria, March 1st, says the world knows no finer example of heroism than that exhibited by fourteen women on one of the five days fighting around Spionkop.

A strictly family party of Boers, fourteen men and their wives, were entrenched in one position and held it with amazing bravery against a small force of British. For a long time the men fought incessantly and kept their wives busy reloading their rifles.

Finally the British soldiers, with fixed bayonets, charged on the entrenchment. As they came closer, the Boer men crept over the earthworks, and while the women began shooting, tried with the butts of their rifles to hammer back the British. Before their wives' eyes, every one of the fourteen Boers were killed—bayoneted or shot.

The fourteen women, so quickly widowed, never thought of surrendering, but fought most valiantly and coolly for half an hour. The British surrounded them; not one of the fourteen survived to mourn her husband. Two days later, when the British forces retired across the Tugela river, twenty-eight corpses, fourteen men, fourteen women, were found within a radius of 100 feet. Now there is a big, long mound where rest the bodies of as brave a band as ever fought for freedom.
