—The lively stable of Mayor Fisher was sold to Messrs. Ursin Patin and J. M. Perry. These gentlemen will replenish their stock and also put in new vehicles to meet the demands of the trade. We wish them success in their new venture.

—The fuel oil business has come to New Iberia to stay. A visit to the wharf in front of the Crystal Ice Works will convince the most skeptical. The steamboat William Kyle and barge was receiving oil from tank cars this morning. The tank barge will hold 1500 bbls. or the contents of ten oil tank cars. This oil flows by gravitation from the cars to this tank. It is then towed to plantations on the bayou and then pumped into the plantation tanks. Capt. C. A. Barker has charge of the steamer and tank boat. It is now delivering daily to the consumers along the bayou, Capt. T. L. Morse is the agent for the Saterfield Oil Co. who have undertaken by this means of supply oil to consumers. They have contracted to deliver one hundred thousand barrels of oil this season, when it is considered that the fuel bill is out down 50 per cent by the use of oil, the great advantage and economy can be readily figured. But the Saterfield company is not the only Richmond in the field. Mr. J. G. Broussard has also embarked in the oil business on his account. He has a contract with Beaumont producers guaranteeing supply, which he now delivers from Jeanerette to upper Teche by steamer Ruth and tank barge, while he has commenced in a modest way he expects to get a share of the business, as he can sell as cheaply as any, thus giving competition and certainty of delivery. He is now delivering oil in the users tank at 55 cents per bbl. Mr. Jeff Roan has charge of the steamer and tank and will give prompt attention to deliveries. It looks as though oil was going to revolutionize our varied industries.
