DRAINAGE.

The Drainage question has taken into itself proportions of moment.

In the last issue of the Enterprise appeared the project of a law prepared by Hon. R. F. Broussard in order to carry out certain plans of drainage. The Council, upon the recommendation of the advocates of that plan, (the opponents being unadvised) approved of the plan.

This brought forth a communication to this body, from Mr. Walter J. Burke, asking that the matter be reconsidered.

We furnish our readers with the document as embodying in substance the grounds of the opposition:

New Iberia, La., June 2nd '02. To the Hon. Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia, La.

GENTLEMEN:—In as much as I will be absent this evening, and thus prevented from attending the session of the Council, I wish to communicate to you in writing, my request as a citizen, that your action in endorsing the plan of the Hon. Robert F. Broussard, for the creation of one drainage district of the City and rural territory, be rescinded.

You adopted the proposition after hearing only one side of the issue. I trust you will give ear to the other.

At the request of an advocate of the proposed plan a meeting of the Progressive League was held. The matter was very thoroughly discussed and a resolution was adopted adverse to the proposition.

The law, as it stands to day, allows any two contiguous districts (drainage districts) to combine in their work, when it is of a common nature. The City charter constitutes your body the drainage commissioners for the City.

Now, if there be any need of drainage for the City, or any part thereof (and such is the case) is constituted the drainage commission to undertake the work. If the work to be undertaken is such as to require joint work with any out-lying district, (and again such is the case) the City Drainage Commissioners and those of the country may come together and determine what proportion of the work is common and what the proportion of each will be in the cost. They then raise the revenues in their respective districts, and jointly pay for the common work.

The Charter of the City of New Iberia exempts it from the jurisdiction of the Police Jury, except to the imposition of a tax for Court House and Jail and criminal purposes.

The change proposed is, that the Police Jury may create a drainage district including the city, the council is to have the authority to ratify this, and by the concurrence of minds in these two bodies, the citizens of this city are to be deprived of their exemption from Police Jury interference. This is specially objectionable when it applies to a question of taxation. By that means the Police Jury can create districts so as to give control by majority, to a country district over a section of the city, and repeat the matter so often as to bring the entire city to the subjection of the rural wards. The approval of the City Council would seal the matter. The franchise rights of the citizens are too important to them, for you to approve of any proposed law, which would leave to you or your successors the option of abridging them. The personnel of the present council is guarantee that such was not in their contemplation.

Another objection to this proposed union is that, if on the other hand, the urban portion of the district should prevail, it may not want the kind or extent of drainage which the country requires. We would defeat a necessary tax, and thus deprive a rural territory of the needed relief. The country and city need one drain in common. The City should pay for its share of this. Do you believe the city will tax itself to pay for all the cross drains which a large rural territory will require, but which will not serve the city?

Again, there can be but one tax, uniform and of similar nature imposed in any one district and for an equal term of years throughout its extent. If it be found advisable (and it seems likely) to impose an acreage tax in the country, how are you to impose it in the city?

The owner of lands in the country is willing to pay, say 10 or 15 cents per acre for the drainage of his property, and that would be a uniform tax on all deriving the benefits. No inequality in the assessment or other cause of complaint. It would suit the country; it would be sturdily in the City.

Again: if you adopt the ordinary method of taxation, based on assessments, and you consider the relative interests of the city so composed to the Country, you will find that the former would be made to bear the burden of the tax. If the work be undertaken by two commissions, working as their interests are common, the city, on its larger assessment, would find, let us say, a two mill tax sufficient to pay its quota of the burden. A similar tax in the country would bring insignificant results, and the rural district would have to impose either an acreage tax, or a larger millage tax so as to do its share of the paying. Each, however, would only pay its share of the work.

If you work but one district, there can be but one tax, and it requires no argument to prove, that New Iberia will be taxed for things it does not receive, or there will be no work.

Finally, the Police Jury has created a drainage district of the out lying territory. These people are going to work. They have attempted to link New Iberia with them have deprived them of much time in drainage work. All other

drainage enterprises undertaken under existing laws, have been terminated, or are nearing completion. Do not incur the risk of again injuring the country brother. If New Iberia wants drainage, let your body, as commissioners, take the necessary steps, unite with the rural district in the common work, pay for what you receive from them, and let each district take care of its own separate interests in its own way.

The issue was reopened by the Council, and on Monday evening was debated by Messrs. E. T. Weeks, R. S. McMahon, E. F. Millard and others for reconsideration, and by Messrs. A. J. Cammack and L. T. Dalaney adversely. The discussion was continued to Tuesday evening and resumed by Messrs. Burke and Dalaney. The debate was animated, if not at times acrimonious.

During the heat of contention, Mr. Burke offered a resolution which seemed to strike those present as an equitable solution. It reads as follows:

Be it resolved, that the proposition contained in the proposed amendment as offered to the City Charter by Hon. R. F. Broussard, to the effect that the City Council may consent with the Police Jury in the creation of a drainage district including city territory, shall be altered so as to submit to the legally qualified tax payers, residing within the limits proposed to be included, and entitled to vote for the drainage tax, determining by the majority in number and amount, the question of the ratification of the act of the Police Jury including said city limits in a drainage district. The question shall be submitted to the tax payers by the city council, and upon the ratification of the tax payers, the district as created by the Police Jury shall be declared to be the drainage district.

The resolution was unanimously adopted, and Mr. Dalaney on his part, and that of his associates, as well as himself, exchanged pledges to use their efforts to have the amendment adopted.

Instead of authorizing the City Council to concur in a plan which may have the effect of subjecting citizens to a tax, it leaves to the taxpayers the option of saying whether or not they desire to enter into any proposed drainage district. If they wish the tax, they will vote to enter the district. If not, they will vote to remain out. In either case, the country districts will not be made to suffer while the city is divided into contention.

The proposition was eminently just; and the mutual pledges for its support were promptly and publicly given. Let all live up to their pledge, which will, in effect, produce harmony.

At the instance of the advocates of the Broussard plan, a meeting of the Progressive League was convened, for its consideration and approval. Many taxpayers attended, and after full discussion, the project was condemned.

This was anterior to the adoption, by the Council, of the amendment offered by Mr. Burke.

The minutes of the City Council will prove of interest to these issues; and we commend them to our readers. Since writing the above we note the Police Jury took up the issue at its last regular meeting. It declared its opposition to any interference with the work of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, and authorized the commission to take necessary steps towards a survey of the territory establishing levels. The action of the Police Jury was based on the petition of the people of the rural district. They propose to do their work, even if the city refuses to bear its portion of the burden.

NEW IBERIA, La., June 5th, '02. The Police Jury convened this day in regular session with President Brittain in the chair and all the members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer submitted his monthly report showing a cash balance of \$1987.25. Reported adopted.

On motion of Mr. Ortle, duly carried, the matter of cementing the outside of the new jail was postponed indefinitely. It was moved, seconded and carried, that Mr. Henry Pharr be permitted to retain gate on East side of bayou until crop is harvested.

Mr. Delebarre is instructed to order Mr. Enache Broussard to close Parish ditch which he opened recently. It was moved by Mr. Suberbielle, and duly carried, that the Police Jury assume payment of cost of survey and other preliminary expenses of the route of the proposed Bayou Carlin Drainage District. Bills to be approved by the Presidents of the respective boards. Said Commissions bind themselves to reimburse the Parish should elections carry.

On motion of Mr. Debar, duly carried, the Sheriff's contract was renewed for one year for \$10,000 and five hundred (\$500) dollars.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: The Police Jury, after considering the statements made by the citizens residing in the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, appearing before this body this day, that the Commissioners should prosecute their work and that this body will not consent to any interference therewith.

Mr. J. A. Provost, on motion, is granted permission to build a tramway across public road on East side Bayou Teche.
