**POLICE JURY ORDINANCE.**

An ordinance submitting to the legal qualified voters residing within the Parish of Iberia the proposition to vote for or against allowing cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, horses, mules, etc., to roam at large in the Parish of Iberia from and after the first day of January A. D. 1902 was presented by Mr. Ortiz and read when it was moved by Mr. Goula, seconded, by Mr. Decourt and unanimously adopted.

Said ordinance reads as follows, to-wit: Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia that an election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held on Tuesday, Jan. 1st, 1902, at each and every voting precinct within the Parish of Iberia, from seven o'clock A. M. for the purpose of taking the census of all legal qualified voters residing within the Parish of Iberia outside of the Corporate limits of the town of New Iberia as to whether or not the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia shall prevent all stock such as cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, horses, mules, etc., from roaming at large within the Parish of Iberia from and after the first day of January, A. D. 1902.

Be it further ordained, That the tickets to be used at said election shall be printed so as to read as follows, to-wit: "To vote for or against a cattle ordinance for the Parish of Iberia. To vote to prevent the roaming of cattle at large within the Parish of Iberia after Jan. 1st, 1902, stamp the white space opposite the words (For cattle ordinance)."

To vote against the adoption of a cattle ordinance stamp the white circle opposite the words (against cattle ordinance). For Cattle Ordinance..... For Against Cattle Ordinance.....

Be it further ordained, That the Board of Supervisors of election of the Parish of Iberia be authorized and instructed to appoint three commissioners and one clerk to serve at each polling place in the Parish of Iberia at said election.

Thus done, read, adopted and signed in open session this 10th day of May A. D. 1902. J. F. BRITAIN, President Police Jury of Iberia Parish.
