**AN ENJOYABLE OUTING.**

About ten days ago a party of gentlemen from our city chartered a sail boat, well manned and went to the coast for a weeks outing. The party consisted of Judge Robt. Brown, S. A. Benthall, D. Blanchet, Ralph Laundry and others, with a cook, sailing master and assistant. It was the intention to go to Cypress-mound Hammock and use the Avery House on that place, but on arriving there it was found to be occupied by a family, who were enjoying the themselves hugely. Thence the party sailed to South West Pass, where they anchored about one hour, meeting a party of fishermen from New Orleans who were catching turtles for that market, to be shipped via Morgan City, instead of via New Iberia, if we had our usual. These fishermen were catching all kinds of fish, Sheephead, Redfish, Spanish Mackerel and many other varieties of toothsome food fish, they were returned to the water as soon as caught as the distance was too great to market, nothing but turtles were kept, which live for a long while without any care or trouble other than a cage or box, to be delivered as convenient to the city restaurants, to be converted in the delicious soups and other famous dishes. The party visited all the cottages on the island, finding them all occupied by families from various sections, all enjoying the surroundings and getting vigor and health, enjoyment and recreation from the balmy atmosphere, the bathing, fishing, games, and excursions over the island. While here the boatman and his assistant went out into the bay some two hundred and fifty yards, where in full view of the party, he brought up the finest oysters ever enjoyed, large, salty,

delicious bivalves, they were served in every style, on the shell, fried, scalloped, gumbo, and broiled in a manner to tempt the appetite of the most delicate or confirmed dyspeptic, truly a feast the memories of which will long remain. Marsh Island, where the party remained, is on the Gulf and covered with live oaks and other shade trees, with a fine beach, making it an ideal resort. If our canal is dug it will be but 27 miles from New Iberia. It is without doubt the finest fishing grounds in this section, evidence of which is the large schools of porpoises which infest the place in search of fish food. Twelve miles west is Cheniere Tigue, inhabited by about 20 families in neat cottages, who live a life of ease, comfort and near to nature's heart, adjoining is a shell bank 200 yards wide and miles in length with millions of barrels of the small, hard, white shells which would make New Iberia's streets and avenues famous, could we but get them here with a reasonable expense. Mosquitoes bothered but one night during a heavy wind, which brought them. The nights were delightfully cool, a blanket being used for comfort, and lying in their hammocks at the sport of the wind, rocked in the cradle of the deep, the party passed six delightful days and nights. The entire expense was within the reach of any ordinary person, being about 75 cents per day per capita, which will commend itself to those desiring "to steal away awhile from cumbering care."
