### "Is the coal trust a conspiracy?"

Is the subject of an interesting article in Gunton's Magazine for September. The facts stated in this article will be a surprise to many people. It is pointed out that in the first place there was absolutely no justification for present conditions, and it is explained: It will be remembered that at the outset, the laborers made no demand whatever; they simply asked that a conference be held to arrange the schedule of prices and other conditions for the ensuing year. That course had previously been adopted. At the close of the strike in 1900, they agreed to that method. It was very satisfactory; and the agreement terminated on the 1st of April, 1902. A very sensible compromise, and therefore, was for both parties to meet, and either confirm the old agreement or arrange a new one for the future. The request for a conference was an ordinary, rational procedure, which nothing but a disposition to create a disturbance could refuse. Yet the railroad men rejected the proposition, and the president of each railroad made a personal reply, the tone, and very largely the language, of the communications were identical, showing that the letters had all been written or revised by the same hand.

In these same letters railroad presidents, according to this same writer refused to confer with the men through their organization, while claiming to be willing to "deal justly and fairly by them (the laborers) and give every man fair compensation for the work he performed." In short the operators insisted upon being sole arbiters of both sides of the contract. In accordance with this idea, a few days later they posted notices at their respective collieries stating that "the rate of wages now in effect will continue until April 1st, 1903, and thereafter be subject to sixty days notice." This was well calculated to create a rupture, and it is difficult to interpret this action in any other light than that it was purposely designed to produce that result. Had there been the slightest element of fairness, or respect for the common right of the laborer to make a contract, or the desire to maintain industrial peace, such arbitrary action could not and would not have been taken. This left the laborers no alternative but to forego all right eventually to participate in bargain making, regarding their own conditions, and to accept a specific demand and strike for it.

### STRIKE SETTLED.

Washington, Oct. 16.—The great anthracite coal strike is settled at last. A commission of six persons, with a seventh, Mr. Carroll D. Wright, as Recorder, will adjust the differences between operators and miners. President Mitchell, of the Miners' Union, will take the necessary measures to call the strike off. The President will urge immediate resumption of mining and operations are expected to begin next week.

Announcement that the great strike was off was made by Secretary Root, with exuberant good humor, at the White House, shortly after 1 o'clock. Organized labor has a representative on the Commission in the person of E. E. Clark, Grand Chief of the Order of Railway Conductors, named as a Sociologist. The President added Bishop Spaulding, of Illinois, to the list of five members suggested by the operators. As named, the Commission is perfectly satisfactory to both miners and operators. Assent of the miners was given through President Mitchell and Mr. Sargent, Commissioner of Immigration, and of the operators through Messrs. Robert Bacon and George W. Perkins, of the banking firm of J. P. Morgan & Co.

The final outcome followed a series of conference beginning with two during the day with Mr. Mitchell and two during the night with Messrs. Bacon and Perkins. Events moved quickly at last, the President being determined on a speedy settlement.

The Commission will assemble in a few days and choose a Chairman, probably General Wilson. It then will arrange for sessions and testimony.

### A COUNTRY THAT HAS NO STRIKES.

"New Zealand has done the most daring things ever attempted by any modern government. The New Zealanders claim that New Zealand is a country without strikes. Laborers and employers have their disputes there as elsewhere, but the one cannot quit work, or the other lock out workmen, pending a settlement of the dispute in courts. It is also a country without paupers or poorhouses, for injured workmen are cared for by their employers. The aged workman is pensioned by the Government as a soldier of industry worn out in the ranks. The Government owns not only the postal system, but the express service, the telegraph and the railroads. Recently it has purchased a coal mine to supply its locomotives with fuel, and it intends to compete with private mines in the sale of coal to the public far enough to keep the price of coal down to a reasonable figure."

**To Its Old Status.**  
Washington, Oct. 15.—Orders will be issued by the War Department to-morrow ordering that the Regular Army be reduced to the minimum size authorized by law, 59,500. With the practical cessation of outbreaks in the Philippines, it is believed that this can be done safely. The present size of the Army is about 67,000 men.

The Cavalry and Artillery Regiments will be reduced to the minimum basis, except around Fort Leavenworth, where the commands will be kept of full size for educational reasons.

Washington, October 10.—According to a story which is going the rounds here today, J. Pierpont Morgan's desire to bring about the political ruin of President Roosevelt is responsible for his continued refusal to intercede in the coal strike. A man who gave as his authority another man who was present at one of the conferences held in New York yesterday told the Post correspondent today that Morgan told Senators Platt of New York and Quay of Pennsylvania that he would bring about a settlement of the strike if they (Platt and Quay) would see to it that the States of New York and Pennsylvania instructed their delegates against Roosevelt in 1904. With these two states against him, it is believed that Roosevelt would find it impossible to secure the nomination. It has been frequently hinted that Morgan would do nothing toward bringing the strike to an end so long as he thought his non-interference would hurt Roosevelt. This story of what happened in New York yesterday lends color to assertions of that kind. It is, however, given merely for what it is worth.—Houston Post.

### Call For Election by the Bayou Carlin Drainage District.

Notice is hereby given that an election by the properly qualified electors, of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, will be held on the 1st day of November, 1902, to elect a Board of Commissioners, the proposition embodied in the resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, adopted on September 23rd, 1902, and being as follows to-wit:

Be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District that the Board of Commissioners now exists by authority of regular organization under the provisions of Act No. 159 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the session of 1902; and whereas the law requires the submission of propositions such as are hereinafter contained, to the resident property tax payers entitled to vote at such elections for their authorization or disapproval thereof; now, therefore,

Be it resolved that an election be held and the same is hereby ordered to be held of the qualified electors, under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District, on the 1st day of November, 1902, after due notice, and publication of notice, in the official journal of the Parish of Iberia, for a period of thirty days as required by law, to take the sense of the property owners upon the following propositions which are hereby submitted to the said property tax payers at said election, namely:

First, To incur an indebtedness of Thirty Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00), for the purpose of constructing a system of drainage for the Bayou Carlin Drainage District.

Second, To authorize the Bayou Carlin Drainage District to issue Thirty Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) forty-year five percent interest bearing mortgage bonds of the face value of One Hundred Dollars each, and numbered from one to three hundred and sixty, respectively, to represent said indebtedness of Thirty Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00). Interest on all said bonds shall be paid annually, to be selected by the lot or chance. The Drainage District to have the option after fifteen years of paying and retiring a greater amount than Twelve Hundred Dollars of said bonds annually, but to be compelled to pay and retire at least that amount; and commencing with the year beginning April 1st, 1913, shall set aside each year sufficient funds for that purpose. Said debt to be incurred, said bonds to be issued, and said tax to be levied under, subject to, and in accordance with, the laws of the State and especially the provisions of Act 145 and 153 of the General Assembly of Louisiana for 1902.

Third, To authorize the Bayou Carlin Drainage District to levy a five mill tax on property within said drainage district subject to State taxation, said taxes to run for a period of forty years. Said taxes shall be applied in the order following, namely:

FOR THE FIRST TEN YEARS.

First, For the payment of interest on the said bonds herein authorized.

Second, For the maintenance of the said system of drainage and improvements.

Third, The balance of said taxes to be placed in a sinking fund.

After the first ten years from date of issuance of said bonds.

First, For the payment of interest on the said bonds herein authorized.

Third, The balance of said taxes to be placed in a sinking fund.
