

PERTINENT QUESTIONS GLEANED FROM THE COMMONER.

Q. How long since the republicans first came into power?

A. Forty-two years.

Q. How many panics have occurred during that time?

A. Two.

Y. When did the first panic begin?

A. 1873.

Q. What party was in power at that time?

A. The Republican party.

Q. To what party did the executive belong?

A. To the republican party.

Q. What party had a majority in the Senate and House?

A. The republican party.

Q. How long had the republican party been in power at that time?

A. About twelve years.

Q. What laws were in force at that time?

A. Laws passed by a republican Legislature.

Q. How long after the panic began did the republican party remain in control of the administration?

A. About eleven years.

Q. When after the war was the first democratic president inaugurated?

A. In 1884.

Q. Did it cause a panic?

A. No.

Q. Did it produce an industrial depression?

A. No.

Q. Was it accompanied by hard times?

A. No; times were as good from 1884 to 1888 as they were during the republican administration that preceded or during the republican administration that followed. It is evident, as far as democratic administration does not always bring bad times.

Q. When did the second panic occur?

A. In 1893.

Q. Who was president at that time?

A. Grover Cleveland.

Q. What party had been in power during the four years previous?

A. The republican party.

Q. What tariff law was on the statute books?

A. The McKinley law.

Q. When was it repealed?

A. About a year after the panic.

Q. What financial law was on the statute books in 1893?

A. The Sherman law passed in 1893.

Q. When was it repealed?

A. After the panic.

It is evident, therefore, that the panic of 1893 came when a republican high tariff law was on the statute books, and when a republican financial law was in force.

Y. What financial policy did Mr. Cleveland pursue while he was in office?

A. A republican policy. He continued the general financial policy in force under the republican administration, and the republican president who followed him continued Mr. Cleveland's financial policy.



MAN IS DEAD.

Cold Spring Harbor, N. Y., Oct. 26.—The coroner to-day held an inquest on the body of John Volkman, a barber, who was accidentally shot and killed last night on the stage of Thespin Hall, by Charles Meinel, of a company which had been giving a two weeks' show in connection with the sale of a medicine. One of the star features of the show was Meinel's feat of shooting an apple from the head of any person who would volunteer to stand up and allow the apple to have his head for a resting place.

Volkman had offered to allow the apple to be placed on his head. Meinel was not shooting well, having missed a card target a short time before the barber came on the stage. When the apple was placed on Volkman's head, Meinel began shooting at a distance of about twenty feet. The first two shots failed to hit either the apple or the man, but the third struck Volkman in the forehead, and he dropped to the stage and died within an hour. Meinel was arrested and held for a hearing, on a charge of manslaughter.

Volkman was 18 years of age, and has a father and mother, who live in Germany.

STORMY IRELAND.

London, Oct. 25.—The apprehension with which the government views the condition of Ireland can be judged from the fact that the chief constable of Birmingham has issued a warning to all arms and ammunition manufacturers not to sell goods for shipment to the proclaimed districts of Ireland.

A special order also has been issued that even to such parts of Ireland as are not proclaimed shipments of arms must be clearly marked as such, under pain of stringent penalties.

With this echo of Ireland's stormiest days comes the announcement of the release of the three Joes, who were undergoing life sentences at Maryborough jail for murder of a whole family of a similar name in 1882. The crime was well known in those days as the Maamtrasna massacre. Ten persons were originally convicted. Nine of them were sentenced to death, but six had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment. The last three of those convicts have now been released, owing to the clemency of the new lord lieutenant of Ireland, the Earl of Dudley. The Earl and Countess of Dudley during their inaugural trip through Galway were approached by the wives and other relatives of the imprisoned men. The wives begged that they might have a chance to meet their husbands again after twenty years of separation. One of the women seized Lady Dudley's hand and wept bitterly as she begged for her intercession. Lord Dudley was much affected and promised to do what he could. The pardon of the three men followed.

NATIVES OF MARTINIQUE ASK FOR INFORMATION.

New York, Oct. 27.—A cable dispatch from Paris says:

Paris, Sunday, Oct. 26.—The Herald publishes, under the heading, "What has become of this money," the following letter:

"To the Editor of the Herald: The kindness you have shown in putting before the readers of the New York Herald my claim, published by several French papers, in support of my countrymen who fell victims to the catastrophe of May 8, urges me to ask you to throw light on a question which I venture to say is not without interest. It is, moreover, a question which will arrest public notice before long, and the successful solving of which can be accomplished by the press, which is a trumpet drum to public opinion, to the latter's honor.

"With a spontaneity which reflects great credit upon it and gladdens the character of its deed, the Government of the United States on the morrow of the catastrophe which destroyed St. Pierre voted the sum of \$500,000, if I mistake not, in aid of its victims. The noise of such generosity re-echoed through the whole world. A committee of the ruined Martinique families added their thanks to those which were forthcoming from Frenchmen at home and abroad.

"Then followed silence in which the American gift was no longer spoken of. It is impossible to find out where it has gone to. The Executive Committee charged with distributing aid to the Martiniquers has just published a financial report, but
