LOCAL NEWS.

—Last Monday night occurred a disastrous fire in the west end of the city which consumed the feed mill of the New Iberia Milling and Development Company causing a total loss. The flames fanned by the wind attacked the Crystal Ice Works of Mr. T. R. Morse, and before any assistance could be rendered, it too, was a mass of smoking ruins. The origin of the fire is shrouded in mystery, one of those unaccountable things that often happen, but it is supposed that the deadly cigarette of some employee at the feed mill had something to do with it. The loss is very heavy. In the case of T. L. Morse some \$21,000 went up in smoke, while some \$6000 was the loss of the Milling Company. The insurance was about one half of the value of the property lost. Much delay was experienced in getting water to the fires, owing to want of organization, or a thorough system. The loss of these two factories will be felt in the community among consumers and wage earners and we trust the gentlemen will see their way clear to resurrect their plants and be ready for business in the near future.

About five o'clock Tuesday morning our community was again aroused by the alarm of fire, this time in the east end of town, on Charles street and corner Charles and Center. The two dwellings occupied by Judge Robert Brown and Dr. W. J. Emmer were consumed. Most of the household goods of Judge Brown were saved through the help of the citizens, but those of Dr. Emmer's were a total loss. The Clero dwelling corner of Center and Main was threatened, but the timely appearance of the firemen and excellent work saved the building and contents. This building was occupied by Superintendent O. J. Muchmore who had just taken possession, having newly furnished it. All the furniture was removed and put back again, without the loss of a single thing. Some of the beautiful live oaks in the Weeks grove, where stood the house of Dr. Emmer, were badly burned and will have to be removed. Again the delay in reaching the fire by the hose was in evidence, but as the hose had but a few hours previous been in use at the upper end of town, being unreeled, it took some time to get them on the reels and to the second fire. The loss of the dwellings was about \$5000, with the usual insurance, about one-half value. These fires accentuate the necessity of organizing hose companies, and having the town districted with a hose carriage and company for each district. Should a fire occur in some of the densely settled sections, the damage would be great unless immediate help could be afforded, such as the nearby hose company could give.

There is not the least doubt that the numerous cases of Typhoid fever that developed the past summer were due to the poisonous atmosphere inhaled last autumn during the grinding and retained in the system until the malarial season came in. They have the plague in the East, it is a wonder that we have not got the pest here, due to the inertia of officials paid for such service. We ask in the name of the suffering, in the name of the health of our people, cannot something be done to abate the nuisance.


