All the while her spiritually lovely face reflected the joy and blessedness she saw and heard. When asked to say whom she saw, she said, "Oh! so many, but there is one so lovely; oh! so lovely," with lingering ecstasy. To be sure that they entirely understood that she was not dreaming she asked each dear one separately, "Don't you believe me?" The blessed darling whose every thought was true. And surely all were grateful for the mercy that gave this comfort in the midst of such an almost unbearable sorrow. The dear Master had come and called for her, the One "Altogether lovely." The brightness of the Father's Glory and the express image of His "person" filled her with joy unspeakable and full of glory. Those who love her best should rejoice in the certainty of her unbounded happiness of which she herself so earnestly bore witness, but oh! to miss her sweet presence during the rest of life's journey, how the heart must ache.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE POLICE JURY.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Police Jury met this day, President Brittain presiding and all the members present except Decont and Deleambre.

The following written proposition for a franchise was submitted after reading of which, on motion of Mr. Orte daily accepted and carried, was unanimously accepted and ordered advertised in the official papers for 30 days. Meeting adjourned.

ORDINANCE.  
An ordinance fixing the terms, conditions and specifications of a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a railway, utilizing electricity, or other motive power than steam, on the public roads in the parish of Iberia, which, following along the Bayou Teche from the lower or eastern limits of the City of New Iberia to the corporate limits of the town of Jeanette, in the parish of Iberville, and fixing the terms, conditions and methods of the sale, and providing for the manner of constructing and completing said railway.

Whereas, there have been presented to this Police Jury written petitions, signed by the property holders and amount of the property holders abutting the public road leading from the southern limits of the City of New Iberia to the upper limits of the town of Jeanette to advertise and sell a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a railway, utilizing electricity, or other motive power than steam, upon the said public roads, between the points aforesaid, and

Whereas, at this called public meeting of the Police Jury, it has been ascertained and does declare that the majority in number and amount of the abutting property holders, on the aforesaid public roads, have signed said petitions, now therefore

Be it resolved by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia:

Sec. 1. That between the hours 11 A. M. and 4 P. M. on the day of 27th of December, A. D. 1902, after due advertisement thereof for thirty days in the official journal of the Parish of Iberia, the President of the Police Jury, shall at the door of the House of the Parish, by public auction, sell to the bidder or bidders for the highest percentage of its gross annual receipts, as hereinafter specified, a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a railway, utilizing electricity, or other motive power than steam, on the entire length of the public road in said parish, leading along the Bayou Teche, between the southern or lower limits of the City of New Iberia to the upper limits of the town of Jeanette, said franchise to be as follows, to-wit:

This franchise shall be for a term of ninety-nine years, and no longer, from the date of sale, and shall, for that period authorize the construction, maintenance, and operation of a single track line of railway, together with all necessary spurs, tables, switches, trestles, and side tracks, from the lower limits of the City of New Iberia to the upper corporate limits of the town of Jeanette, and along the Bayou Teche, between the southern or lower limits of the City of New Iberia to the upper limits of the town of Jeanette, said franchise to be as follows, to-wit:

Sec. 2. No fare, toll or charge exceeding two cents per passenger, or his or her ordinary hand baggage, or parcels, shall be made or collected for passage on said railroad, nor for a continuous passage from within either of said towns (or a point between) to any point in either of said towns reached by said railway or its connections, provided the fee of five cents a ride for any distance whatever, not exceeding two miles, may be collected. The said railway may be operated commonly, and not less than two trains each way carrying passengers between the said towns, at hours arranged by the Police Jury, in the direction of the public. And in the event of not more than two trains being run each way daily, not less than six hours shall elapse between the two trains going in the same direction. The said railway shall have the right to carry freight, express, baggage and mail, as well as passengers and to perform all functions usually carried out by a railroad of this character.

FOREFEITURE OF FRANCHISES.  
In the event the holder or holders of this franchise fail to conform substantially to the foregoing terms, conditions and specifications, after he or they have been given four months notice of such failure and neglect, and have not corrected such failure or neglect, this franchise shall cease to exist and terminate without any further proceedings.

Be it further resolved, etc.  
Sec. 3. That every bid or sale of said franchise shall state what percentage of the gross annual receipts of said railway on the said road between the said towns, (1) for the first year, (2) for the second year, (3) for the third year, (4) for the fourth year, (5) for the fifth year, (6) for the sixth year, (7) for the seventh year, (8) for the eighth year, (9) for the ninth year, (10) for the tenth year, shall be given for each successive period of ten years during the existence of said franchise, except the last which shall be for a period of nine years.

Sec. 4. Be it further resolved that the sum of one hundred dollars in cash or a certified check for that amount shall be deposited with the President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia at the moment of adjudication on the 27th day of December, A. D. 1902, the day of the sale, which one hundred dollars shall be forfeited to the parish, unless within four months from the sale the successful bidder shall accept by public act before an competent Notary Public the terms of this ordinance, in which event the said one hundred dollars shall be returned to the successful bidder, and shall agree and undertake to said public act to construct not less than one half a mile of the said

railway within eighteen months from the date of said act, and to complete the whole and entire line provided for within the term of the expiration of the said eighteen months, and shall execute and deliver to the President of the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, a bond with security approved by the President of the Police Jury in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), conditioned on the full and faithful performance of said undertaking and contract.

In the event the bidder fails to make the deposit of \$100 dollars in cash, or a certified check as hereinbefore provided for at the moment of adjudication, then the President of the Police Jury, at once, and without further formality, shall offer for sale the said franchise and shall adjudicate the same to the last and highest bidder who does make the required deposit.

And in the event the successful bidder shall fail to enter into the notarial contract, as hereinbefore provided, within the time stated the same shall be forfeited to the parish, and the franchise shall cease to exist and all rights of the bidder shall also cease and be forfeited without any further formality whatever.

Sec. 5. Be it further resolved that the holder or holders of this franchise shall have the right to transfer and assign the same, but without express to the parish, and in the event the holder or holders of this franchise are to be allowed the time consumed by such calamity and shall not be considered as having passed as to the date of the franchise, provided such above named calamities in any manner affect the carrying on of the work herein.

Sec. 6. Be it further resolved that in the event of war, pestilence, epidemic, strikes, panics, or other public calamities, and in that event the holder or holders of this franchise are to be allowed the time consumed by such calamity and shall not be considered as having passed as to the date of the franchise, provided such above named calamities in any manner affect the carrying on of the work herein.

Sec. 7. Be it further resolved that in constructing the said railway as herein provided for, that the holder or holders of this franchise shall have the right to leave the public road at any place where there are sharp curves or bends in the same and shall not be required to build said road along said public road, but shall be allowed as above stated to build said road across the area of said bends or curves in order to save time and make said road shorter.

Sec. 8. Be it further resolved, that due notice be given and advertisement for thirty days be made in the official journal of the Parish of Iberia, of the contents of this said franchise, its terms, conditions and specifications, all in accordance with the provisions of act No. 88 of the General Assembly of Louisiana for the year 1902.

COSTS AND INCIDENTALS.  
Sec. 9. Be it further resolved that the successful bidder or bidders shall pay all costs incident to the sale of this said franchise.
