

It has been my fortune, as business associate in many enterprises, to become intimately acquainted with hundreds of men, who, without any equipment whatever of education, have accumulated millions of dollars. I never met with one of them whose regret was not profound and deep and poignant that he had not an education.

Here liberty rests upon the intelligence of the people, and it is pure or it is base according to the character of that intelligence. Every college is an insurance

company against any arohand socialism. Every fully equipped and thoroughly educated boy and girl is a missionary for the right in the State, in society, in religion and in morals.

With the body of her murdered husband in the baggage car ahead a baby girl dead in her arms, and a four-year-old son crying piteously for his father at her side, Mrs. Buckley, of Bonham, Texas, passed through this city en route to her former home in Hickory, Miss. Every employer of labor throughout the State is authorized to withhold the amount of the poll tax for the current year out of the wages of his employee, and he is made responsible for this tax due by the men he employs. All of the old stringent requirements against the sheriffs and assessors are renewed, and the former are held liable for all polls not collected or for which the reasons for non-collection are not given in writing. These acts and provisions will be in full force as soon as the election returns are promulgated, but they have been entirely overlooked. Sheriffs and assessors become derelict at once who fail to comply with these stringent requirements.—Rice Bell Journal.
