ACT 107—SECTION 5 OF 1902.

The practice of carrying concealed weapons is so reprehensible, and so fraught with evil consequences, that our legislators have passed most stringent laws on this subject. As the practice obtains here to a certain extent, generally without a knowledge of the law we publish the statute on same and call attention to all pistol toters, that they run a great risk in violating this law, which punishes severely all those who disregard it. We trust all will read and digest this law, it may save them money and the disgrace of imprisonment.

Sec. 9. "Be it further enacted, etc., That the offense of carrying concealed weapons shall be graded as follows: Whoever shall carry a weapon or weapons concealed on or about his person, such as pistols, bowieknives, dirks, daggers, razors, metal knuckles, or any other dangerous weapon, and shall, with such weapon so concealed attend any ball, theatre, picnic, or other place of amusement, or any convention, mass meeting or other assembly, shall be fined not more than three hundred dollars, nor less than fifty dollars, or be imprisoned not more than six months nor less than thirty days, or both at the discretion of the Court; who ever shall carry such weapon so concealed, under any other circumstances than those herein above mentioned, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars nor less than ten dollars, or imprisoned not more than three months nor less than ten days or both, at the discretion of the Court; provided that the provisions of this section shall not apply to sheriffs and their Deputies, Constables, Policemen and Town Marshals or persons vested with police power, when in the active discharge of their duties; provided, however, that no such person can claim immunity under this section, if he be or become intoxicated while carrying such weapons so concealed.

The following statistics concerning the New Iberia Public Schools cannot fail to be of interest:

- Number of pupils coming to school in conveyances, buggies, etc., 21
- Number of conveyances, buggies, etc., 21
- Number of pupils coming to school on horseback, 21
- Pupils coming to school on horseback and in buggies, etc., 21
- Longest distance pupils now come to school, 7 1/2 Miles.
- Shortest distance pupils now come to school, 1 1/2 Miles.
- Average distance for the above sixty nine pupils, 3 3/4 Miles.
- Combined distance for these sixty nine pupils, 259 Miles.
- Distance coming and returning, 518 Miles.
- Distance walked by pupils from the country to school, 518 Miles.
- Total distance traveled by country pupils per day, 525 Miles.
- Number of pupils living five miles or more from town, 23 Pupils.

If the above distance was covered by one pupil alone, he would travel, during a nine months term of school, a distance nearly equal to circumnavigating the earth four times, and in two and one-half years, of nine months each, he could start out and reach the moon.


