**TILLMAN WANTS TO GET OUT OF JAIL.**

Columbia, S. C., Feb. 7.—Col. James H. Tillman surprised the people of Columbia today by asking Jailer Sealey to telephone to the newspapers that he had applied for bail and that as soon as it was granted he would leave the city for his home in Edgefield. Notice was served during the day on Attorney General Garter, that on February 12, formal application would be made by Tillman to the supreme court for bail and ex-Judge W. C. Buchanan went to Newberry to prepare the application. There is no doubt that Tillman will be admitted to bail. In fact, little effort, if any, will be made in opposition, as Gonzales' people do not object to Colonel Tillman being out of jail. It is safe to say, however, that the amount asked will not be less than \$50,000, and may be more. Tillman says he can furnish any amount up to \$275,000 at half an hour's notice. Immediately after the request the attorneys deemed it best that he remain in jail and made no application for his release, though he asked it. He has intimated that he will make a statement when he reaches Edgefield.

**SENSATIONAL JOURNALISM SHOULD BE CORBED**

Sensational journals have arisen all over the land, the owners in concealment and the writers and the purveyors undesignated, and they have thriven by propagating crime and disseminating falsehood and scandal, by promulgating discussion and anarchy, by attacks upon individuals and by assaults upon government and the agencies of the people.

They are a terror to the household, a detriment to the public service and an impediment to the courts of justice. It would be helpful and profitable to reputable journalism if they could be suppressed. I have suggested for the consideration of the legislature of my state whether or not it would be well to extend to such cases the law of negligence, as developed by the decision of our courts, so that there should be liability in damages for the physical and mental suffering caused by publications made without "reasonable care." I have further suggested an inquiry as to the propriety of requiring that the names and residences of the owners of newspapers be published with each issue.—Herald, Dallas.

**SOME MORE OF THE FRUITS**

A press dispatch from Jackson, Mississippi gives the following as showing the fruits of the Roosevelt-Hays policy. Here are two candidates for "glory" by the grape vine route.

Two Mississippi negroes, one at Forest, and the other Clinton, have come near stretching hemp during the past week and for the timely intervention of some of the older heads, would have done so. At Forest a big, burly negro walked into the parlor of Capt. S. B. Parrish and took a seat in the presence of his wife and daughter. They commended him to leave, but he would not. A telephone message soon brought a number of friends to the house and the negro was roughly handled from there to jail, where he was lodged, thanks to the interference of the sheriff.

In the case of the Clinton negro, there came near being a hanging sure enough, and it was with the greatest difficulty that it was prevented. The negro had been employed to cut cord of wood, and when the dinner bell sounded he walked into the house and washed his hands in the family bowl and prepared to take dinner. The ladies of the house called for assistance, which came on the double-quick. The negro has not yet been able to tell just exactly how he got out of house. These incidents are mentioned to show what effect the Indiana postoffice incident is having on the negroes of the State. Such a thing was never before heard of.—Advocate
