OFFERED PAYNE A BRIDE.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Sept. 23 — Having read the accounts of the scandal and bribery investigations in the Postoffice Department at Washington, Andrew S. Wallace, until recently Postmaster at Opp, Ala., thought that he might as well profit by the state of affairs a little himself. The Postmaster-ship at Andalusia, Ala., had become vacant, so Mr. Wallace wrote a personal letter to Postmaster General Payne, stating that the Andalusia office was better than the one at Opp, and that he desired to make a change. He stated that, in order to compensate the Postmaster general for the trouble, he would pay him \$50 as soon as the order for the transfer was issued. Wallace did not receive the order. Instead, the letter was forwarded to Paul E. Williams, Chief Inspector of the Southern Division, with headquarters here. As a result, Wallace was removed from his office at Opp, arrested, and at a preliminary hearing was held to await the action of the United States Court at Birmingham.

Notice of Democratic Primary Election.

Call of the Democratic Executive Committee of the Parish of Iberia.

New Iberia, La., Sept. 11th, 1903.

The Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of the Parish of Iberia having called a meeting thereof by notice mailed to each member, stating the object to be the calling of a primary election, and said notices having given the date and the hour of such meeting, having been met as is customary in this parish, the Committee met on this day with the following members present, being a quorum, to-wit:

E. J. Gary, Aug. Delebrant, O. P. Romero, Albert Boutte, Cio Romero, Adolph Romero, Max Levy, Eugene Arceneux, Dr. Geo. P. Minville, V. J. Poirson, D. Avery, Geo. M. Robertson, S. O. Nuckolls, Walter J. Burke, Jos. A. Provost, St. Paul Bourgeois, Proxime-T. Gonsoulin, A. J. Dourir, Jos. Delebrant.

On motion, duly made and seconded, it was resolved:

Whereas it is in the interest of harmony in the Democratic party of the Parish of Iberia, and also to the manifest advantage of the citizens thereof that there should be a separation of the primaries for the general State primaries to be held for the election of candidates for States offices; and whereas in ordering this separation of primaries it is the belief of the members of the Parish Democratic Executive Committee that there will be eliminated from the selection of our local officers all partisanship; that the officers will be nominated on their own merits, and not as the parasites of any gubernatorial candidate or the factions supporting any of them; it is therefore resolved that there be held special primaries for all parish and ward officers, at such time and under such rules as shall be prescribed by the Executive Committee.

Be it further resolved that the Democratic voters of the Parish be requested to unite in selecting their parish and ward officers from a non factional standpoint, and with a view to a good and efficient public service; that in the selection of these officers, State issues and candidates be avoided; and in the end, their internal affairs having been adjusted, they should exercise their own judgment again united in voting for the candidates for State officers.

Be it resolved:

1st. That a Democratic Primary Election be held in the Parish of Iberia, on the 31st day of October, 1903, and that the following places shall be as follows:

1st Ward—Crescent Club Hall. 2nd Ward—Crescent Store. 3rd Ward—J. A. Babin. 4th Ward—St. Clair Dugan. 5th Ward—Public School. 6th Ward—Iberia No. 1. 7th Ward—M. Delebrant. 8th Ward—P. O. Building. 9th Ward—City Hall. That the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock A. M., and be closed at 6 o'clock P. M.

2nd. There shall be three Commissioners and one Clerk at each polling booth. These commissioners shall preside over and conduct the election in their respective polling places, and they shall have the same qualifications as are required of the voters themselves at the precinct over which they preside. These commissioners and clerks shall be appointed by the Chairman of this Parish Executive Committee on the recommendation of the opposing candidates for parish offices. These recommendations must be made in writing and must be handed to the Chairman of the Democratic Parish Executive Committee at least ten (10) days before the day of election. Chairman must without delay make the appointments and publish the names, together with the precincts or polling booths in which they are to serve. This publication must be made at least

once in the official journal of the Parish before the day of election. The Chairman shall apportion these election officers as equally as possible among the opposing candidates and individuals seeking the suffrages of the Democratic voters at this election.

3rd. The objects for which this primary is called are for the purpose of electing Democratic candidates for Sheriff, Assessor, Clerk of Court, for Coroner, for two Representatives to the State Legislature, for the Judge of the City Court of the City of New Iberia, for Constable for said City Court of the City of New Iberia, and one Justice of the Peace and one Constable each for the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Seventh, and two Justices of the Peace and two Constables for the Eighth Ward, and for one Police Juror for the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Seventh Wards, and for three Police Jurors for the Sixth Ward, and for two Police Jurors for the Eighth Ward. Also for a Democratic Executive Committee to be composed of duly qualified electors, each ward being entitled to one member for every one hundred (100) duly qualified electors, and one additional member for every fraction over fifty (50) duly qualified electors, which will entitle the different wards to the following representation:

1st Ward—One member, 2nd Ward—One member, 3rd Ward—One member, 4th Ward—Two members, 5th Ward—One member, 6th Ward—Four members, 7th Ward—One member, 8th Ward—Two members.

4th. The qualifications of voters at said primary election shall be that they are White Democrats, Registered voters, and shall have paid their poll taxes for the years 1901 and 1902 in the years in which they were due, and shall, if challenged, make oath as follows: "I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am a White Democrat; that I have not voted for the nominee of any political party except the Democratic party at the last congressional election, and that at the next general State election I will support the nominees of the Democratic Party who may be selected at this primary election, or at a subsequent one should such become necessary by failure to nominate at this primary election. So help me God." This affidavit shall be attached to his ballot which shall be deposited in the ballot box.

5th. The Chairman shall make up a budget of the probable expenses in detail and publish the same at least three weeks before the election. Each candidate and each individual shall at least (10) days before the day of election deposit with the Chairman their proportionate share of these expenses. Any surplus remaining after the elections will be refunded to those contributing in proportion to the amount by them paid. Should any candidate refuse to pay his proportionate share of said expenses any ballots cast for him shall not be counted.

6th. Voting at this election shall be by ballot. The tally sheets, ballot-boxes, poll lists and other paraphernalia necessary to conduct the election shall be provided by the Chairman through a committee of one (1) designated by him for that purpose, and these shall be by the Chairman, through this committee, delivered to the commissioners, of election at each polling precinct before the hour fixed for the opening of the polls.

7th. The said primary election shall be in all respects conducted under the provisions of Act No. 133 of 1900, commonly known as the Primary Election Law, but in addition thereto it shall be the duty of the commissioners and clerks at each polling place to keep duplicate lists of the persons voting at such polling place, each list to be numbered consecutively from One (1) to the end, and such lists so kept and numbered shall be signed and sworn to as correct by them immediately after closing the polls and before opening the ballot boxes. One of these lists shall be deposited in the ballot box and the other shall be transmitted with the other returns to the Chairman of the Parish Executive Committee.

8th. After the closing of the polls the votes shall be canvassed and tabulated as provided by Sec. 3 of Act No. 133 of 1900, and these returns secured in sealed packages shall be delivered by the commissioners, or at least two of them, to the Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee. On the third day after the election the Democratic Executive Committee shall meet at the City Hall at New Iberia, at 10 o'clock P. M., and shall publicly canvass and compile the returns and proclaim the result of the election.

9th. A candidate to be nominated must receive a majority of the votes cast for the candidates competing for any one office. Provided, that in case where two or more offices of the same are to be filled, as for instance two or more members of the General Assembly, or two or more Justices of the Peace, the successful shall be required to receive a majority of the votes cast for one such office, which shall be determined by dividing the vote cast for all of the candidates for such offices by the number of offices; the candidate or candidates receiving a majority of such portion to be declared the nominee. Should no candidate receive such a majority, there shall be no nomination, but a second primary election will be held, and in such election only the two candidates for each office having received the highest number of votes shall participate. Said second primary election will be held on the Wednesday of the week following the date of the first primary, and shall be conducted under the rules and regulations herein provided in so far as practicable.

10th. And, that these proceedings shall be published at least once a week for a period of not less than thirty (30) days in a newspaper published in this parish, and the said publication to be headed by a conspicuous caption in letter type reading as follows: **Notice of Democratic Primary Election.**

CHARTER

The Salt Water Lumber Co., Ltd.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia.

Be it known, that on this 1st day of the month of September, A. D. 1903, before me, John E. Schwing, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereunto subscribed, all of full age, who declared that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State, relative to corporations and especially of Act No. 36 of 1888 of the General Assembly of Louisiana, they have covenanted and agreed and by these presents covenant and agree and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the purposes and objects and under the stipulations, articles and conditions, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of the said corporation shall be "The Salt Water Lumber Company, Limited," and its domicile is hereby established in Patoutville, State of Louisiana and under its said corporate name, said corporation shall have the power and authority to contract sue and be sued to make a corporate seal and the same to break and alter at pleasure, to hold, receive, have, purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its said corporate name, property, real, personal, and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents, managers or employees, as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs as may be deemed necessary and proper and the same to change at pleasure and to do all other acts or things permitted by law, or as shall be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purpose of said corporation.

Said corporation unless sooner dissolved in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for the period of Ninety Nine (99) years from and after the date hereof.

The President and in his absence the Vice-President or Secretary shall be the proper person upon whom citation or other legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be the following, to-wit: to buy and sell lands, with timber, to purchase timber, to cut and saw timber into merchantable lumber and to sell same; to construct, work and maintain canals, railroads or ditches and bridges necessary for the proper carrying on of its business; to erect, operate and own a mill for cutting timber; to own and operate one or more boats for dragging timber or for the purposes in connection therewith, and to carry on generally a lumber manufacturing and said mill business, and to do everything necessary and convenient in connection with the business.

ARTICLE III.

The capital stock of the said corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand and 00/100 (\$100,000.00) Dollars divided into and represented by One Thousand (1000) shares of One Hundred and 00/100 (\$100) Dollars each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of subscription, or the same may be issued at not less than par for labor done or property actually received by the corporation, or the same may be issued full paid for money advanced or for such other valuable consideration or services as the Board of Directors may determine; provided that no stock shall be issued until the consideration therefor has been received by the said corporation.

Any stockholder may sell, assign or transfer his stock in this corporation, provided thirty (30) day's notice of such intention to sell, assign or transfer the same be given the corporation and the shareholders shall have the first privilege of purchasing same. In the event the shareholders refuse to buy the same, it shall be sold in open market at expiration of notice.

All transfer of stock shall be made upon the books of the corporation.

This corporation shall commence doing business as soon as Ten Thousand and 00/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars the capital stock, shall have been subscribed and paid in.

The Board of Directors shall have the right to determine how much stock shall be issued.

ARTICLE IV.

The corporate power of this corporation shall be invested in and exercised by a Board of Five (5) Directors, consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer and two stockholders. Three (3) members of said Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and their decisions shall be corporate acts.

The following persons shall compose the first Board of Directors H. Patout, President; J. B. Brown, Vice-President; Willie Patout, Secretary-Treasurer, Silvio Broussard and C. A. Poirson two shareholders of this corporation.

Said Board shall continue in office until the first Tuesday of August A. D. 1904, on which date thereafter annually, a Board of Directors shall be elected, unless the same falls on a holiday, in which event the election shall be held on the next legal day thereafter. Notice of said election shall be given in writing at least Ten (10) days immediately preceding such election and the President shall act and preside at such elections. Any failure from any cause whatsoever to elect the Directors at such meeting, shall not dissolve the corporation, but the Directors then in office, as well as the officers of said corporation, shall hold over until their successors are elected. In any such event the President shall cause another election to be held within Thirty (30) days, and shall give notice thereof as above provided for.

At every election and meeting each stockholder shall be entitled to vote for each share of stock registered in his name, and may vote by proxy.

The election of Directors shall be by ballot and the majority in amount of votes cast (each share of stock voted upon to be counted for one vote) shall elect the person for whom they have been cast.

After each election the Board of Directors shall elect from their own number the officers of said corporation.

ARTICLE V.

The Board of Directors shall have full power to fill vacancies in their number caused by death, resignation or otherwise, from among the stockholders of the corporation.

The said Board shall have full control of the property of the corporation and shall so conduct, manage and use the same as in their discretion they deem fit, and that is consistent with the objects and purposes of this corporation, or the welfare of the same.

The said Board is further authorized to frame and adopt such by-laws, rules and regulations as the affairs and business of the corporation may require and as it may deem necessary for the conducting and management thereof; provided the same shall not conflict with the charter, or with the laws of the State or of the United States.

The said Board shall elect or appoint an assistant Secretary and such other officers, agents, employees, servants and clerks, as it may deem necessary for the carrying on of the business of the corporation; fix their compensation, term of service, with the right to dismiss them at said Board's pleasure and said Board shall have the right to fix and determine the salaries of the several offices herein provided for.

ARTICLE VI.

This charter may be changed, modified or amended, the capital stock increased or decreased, or this corporation may be dissolved at a meeting of the shareholders convened for that purpose, with the assent of Three-Fourths (3/4) of the entire capital stock, subscribed, whether represented or present at such meeting. Ten (10) days prior notice of such meeting shall be given. In case of dissolution or termination of this corporation, either by limitation of its charter or from any cause, the liquidation of its affairs shall be conducted by Three (3) commissioners, selected from the stockholders, with like assent and at meeting called for that purpose, as set forth above.

Said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been liquidated. In case of the death of one or more of the commissioners, the survivor or survivors shall continue in office and settle the affairs.

ARTICLE VII.

No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares of stock subscribed for or owned by him, nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his stock.
