CHARTER.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia.

Be it known that on this 19th day of February A. D. 1904, before me, Fred W. Bannan, a Notary Public in and for the Parish of Iberia, La., duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, several persons came and appeared the personal persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State relative to the organization of corporations, they have agreed and bind and obligate them selves, as well as such other persons as may become associated with them and their successors, do form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law for the objects and purposes and under the conditions and stipulations as contained and set forth in the following articles to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this corporation shall be EARTH GINNING COMPANY, LTD., it shall exist for the full term and period of twenty years from the date hereof.

ARTICLE II.

The domicile of this company shall be in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, and all citations and other legal process shall be served upon the President of said corporation, or, in case of his absence or inability to act upon the Vice-President.

ARTICLE III.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be the buying, selling and ginning of cotton, and the manufacturing of its products, also the buying, selling and milling of corn, and other agricultural products, and all works kindred to these undertakings, and for said purposes to lease and hold real estate, erect suitable buildings, thorough and equip them with all the necessary machinery, and generally to do all that may be requisite for the carrying out of the purposes above mentioned.

ARTICLE IV.

This corporation may sue and be sued in its corporate name, hold, have, receive, convey, sell, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge, lease, and sublease and enjoy real and personal property; also borrow money and make contracts, receive grants of land and personal property, and make and enter into contracts, the same to alter and break at pleasure; name and appoint such managers, directors, officers, clerks and agents as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require, make and establish such by-laws, regulations of the affairs of said corporation as may be necessary and the same to alter and change at pleasure, and shall possess all the rights, powers and privileges to which corporations are or may be by any general law or laws of this State authorized and entitled to possess.
