THE RICE MARKET. With fair demand market is firm. Demand runs principally for Honduras sorts and on slightly parcels of such values are well defined. Japan styles have been somewhat neglected, although it is in favor with a large class of trade; the present attractive range of values is drawing more general attention.

Advices from the South note slow conditions on the Atlantic coast. Factors in that locality are good holders, but this season their patience has been sorely tried. At New Orleans, market is firm with good demand; not up to the previous week, but sufficient to sustain current values.

In the interior, Southwest Louisiana and Texas, holders are firm, with disposition to advance rates on medium and better grades. Buyers are not responding very enthusiastically to this intimation of higher prices, and are disposed to let their stocks run down, instead of carrying a somewhat full hand as has been the rule for some weeks past.

Talmenge, New Orleans, telegraphs Louisiana crop movement to date: Receipts, rough, 1,566,200 sacks; last year, 1,286,850 sacks. Sales cleaned (est) 1,298,833 pockets; last year, 1,147,685 pockets. Fair command.
