CONVICTION OF SENATOR BURTON.

United States Senator Joseph R. Burton, of Kansas, was convicted by a jury in the Federal court at St. Louis yesterday on a charge of having accepted compensation to protect before the Postoffice Department the Rialto Grain and Securities Company, a swindling concern that had been making use of the mails to gather in its victims. The evidence presented on the trial of the case showed that Senator Burton had been employed in his official capacity by the concern to look after its interests at Washington and to prevent the Postal Department from issuing a fraud order against it which would bar it out of the mails and break up its dishonest business. Senator Burton's connection with the company as its agent was established beyond the shadow of a doubt and conviction followed.

It would appear from the testimony given by Senator Burton in his own defense that he was the most innocent individual ever hauled up before the cruel beak of justice. He admitted that he accepted a retainer of \$500 per month from a company doing an illegal business and with refreshing simplicity declared he did so because he "needed the money." If he had rested his case with this statement he would have now in the hour of his trouble the sympathy of his associates in the senate, but this he forfeited by taking the court and the jury into his confidence and informing them that he merely followed the example of his senatorial brethren, many of whom made large sums of money by "practicing before the department," some of them making as much \$30,000 or \$40,000 a year, while he was content—as a beginning—with \$2,500. To thus give away the grafting operations of the senate will cause that august body to burn with indignation, and it is quite safe to say that in the cloak rooms the verdict has already been reached that Burton is "a d—d fool, who talks too much." He will never be forgiven by his fellow grafters in the senate for his statement in open court, even if they are more deserving of judgment and conviction than he. If he is sent to jail they will rejoice, because he has been guilty of the unpardonable blunder—worse than a crime—of disclosing senate secrets. The country is, however, very much obliged to Mr. Burton for his confession that he is not the only grafter in "the greatest deliberative body on earth," but there are many others in it.—Daily States.

## TOWN DESTROYED BY DYNAMITE

Salt Lake City, Utah, Feb. 20.—A score or more of people were blown to pieces and many were injured in a frightful disaster which occurred on the cut off on the Southern Pacific railroad that crosses the Great Salt Lake west of Ogden. Two freight trains collided yesterday afternoon, causing a wreck, and in the collision two loads of giant powder and dynamite exploded. The little town of Junction was destroyed and a thousand feet of railroad track was blown away.

## WOMAN'S PEN PORTRAIT.

Helen M. Gougar, Noted American Writer, Describes William Randolph Hearst.

In these days, when much is being written about leaders in national life, a woman's estimate of prominent individuals is always apropos. Helen M. Gougar, who has met nearly all of America's noted men and who has written numerous interesting stories and interviews, published the following in the Lafayette (Ind.) Call:

"Who is William Randolph Hearst?"

"I will answer as I know the man.

"He was born in San Francisco.

"He is the only child of the late United States Senator George Hearst and Phoebe A. Hearst.

"His ancestors were of North Carolina and Virginia stock, his mother being a descendant of the Randolphs of Virginia. His mother is noted for her great charities, having endowed the University of California.

"He is a most devoted son and co-operates heartily with his mother in business and benevolent enterprises.

"He was educated in the public schools of San Francisco and in Harvard college.

"He is a man of fine physique, robust health, indomitable energy and great executive ability. He is a 'business man' in every sense of the word.

"He is exceedingly temperate in habits, never gambles or races horses, but is a devotee of the automobile. He once owned a yacht, but during the Spanish-American war it was fitted up as a cruiser at his expense, and he presented it to the government, then enlisted himself as a private in the war and risked his life on the firing line before Santiago.

"In April, 1903, he married Miss Millcent Willson of New York. This is a charming romance connected with this marriage. Miss Willson was a poor girl. Mr. Hearst met her and fell desperately in love with the vivacious miss. His affection was reciprocated. He requested her parents to put her in

college and he would furnish the money for her highest possible education. After her graduation he took her and her mother on a tour of the world that she might have the culture of travel. She is a very beautiful woman, with a charming personality. She is much beloved by the mother of Mr. Hearst.

"Mr. Hearst is a strict moralist and holds women in high esteem.

"His charities are unbounded. Every winter he furnishes free coal, food and raiment to thousands of the suffering poor of the tenement districts of New York, which city is his present residence. He sent out three relief trains—one from New York, another from Chicago and another from San Francisco—to the Galveston sufferers. He gave large sums for the relief of the Jews in Russia; also to the victims of the St. Pierre volcano district.

"As a newspaper man he has had a remarkable career. He understands the business in detail, from setting type to the printing of the first page of a newspaper.

"He is a first-class writer and a first-class editor. He has written about 150 articles, and has been a resident on place in the west for some time.

The cost of a full-page for single issue is \$4,000. The Procter & Gamble Co., have made a three-years' contract for a single page in each issue, to be devoted to the advertisement of Ivory Soap. For this space they pay \$4,000 a month, or \$48,000 a year, and \$144,000 for the term of three years. Think of the risk a firm runs in investing \$4000 in a single page advertisement! How can they expect to get back the equivalent of such a sum of money from a single advertisement?"

## REMARKABLE REVIVAL OF SECTIONALISM.

The remarkable revival of North and South sectionalism in Congress is attracting general attention.

Not since the Reconstruction days of the Reconstruction era has the family perpetrated on the Southern people after the close of the Civil War has there been such an outbreak of angry discussion on the subject in both houses of Congress, but chiefly in the popular branch. Scarcely a day passes without more or less heated talk on the South's alleged ill-treatment of the negroes, and it is to plain that the race question is being made the principal stock-in-trade of the Republican party for the coming presidential campaign.

The Republican Party was founded on sectional hate towards the Southern people, and its main object, besides dominating the country, was to free the Southern negroes and put them on a political and social level with, if not above, their former masters. For a time the Party neglected the negroes and carried on its policy without regard to them, but litterly it has come to be that there is no issue upon which the Republican faction that are so actively antagonizing each other can be brought in harmony, and it appears that the negro question, upon which the Party was founded, is to be relied on to secure a coming together of the warring factions. Moreover, if sectional antipathies and hates can be again generally aroused, many Northern Democrats can be turned against the South.

The revival of this matter in the debates of Congress may be taken as a menace that the negro question will be prominent in the campaign, and should it result in Mr. Roosevelt's election he will make it a leading feature in his strenuous reign, or administration, however it may be called.—Pica-yune.
