NEGRO KILLED ON EXCURSION TRAIN.

Last Sunday night as the east bound New Orleans excursion train, was nearing Olivier Station, just above the parish line, a free-for-all fight took place in one of the rear coaches occupied exclusively by negroes.

From the best information obtainable, the trouble originated from some of the negroes of another coach trying to crowd their way through the aisle, which was packed.

Starting with a fist fight, in a few minutes pistols and razors were drawn and some ten or twelve shots fired into the packed car. When order was finally restored by the train crew and some of the white passengers it was found that Joe Turner, of Bayou Boeuf, was mortally wounded and he died just before the train reached Morgan City.

Alex Moore, of Franklin was shot in the leg and was taken off at Franklin. An unknown negro was also slightly wounded, and some half a dozen others were cut and possibly shot.

Owing to the crowded condition of the train, and also to the fact that the negroes scattered in the other coaches, it was impossible to learn the actual result of the fight.

The Sheriff, of Franklin was on hand when the train arrived there and arrested William Lindsay, of Bayou Boeuf, who is charged with the killing of Joe Turner.

The prisoner was afterwards turned over to the New Iberia authorities, as the shooting took place in Iberia Parish.

Primary ordered, to select a judge of the first district of the first circuit.

Crowley, La., Aug. 1, 1904.—The committee appointed at the meeting held here on July 20th, to adopt rules and regulations and to set the date for the primary for the election of a judge of the first district of the first circuit, met in this city Saturday afternoon and carried the meeting into the night, before the rules were finally adopted.

The result is that a Democratic primary election has been called for Saturday, Sept. 10, when the voters will choose among the various candidates. Representatives were here from the various parishes of the district, as well as several of the candidates, who have announced their intention of running for the office.

Crow Girard of Lafayette pleaded substituted the motion, placing the amount at \$375, which was carried. Both Mr. Soumyrac and Judge W. C. Perrault of St. Landry "stood pat" that no candidate should be barred from the race because of an exorbitant entrance fee.

Mr. Soumyrac offered a resolution requesting all commissioners to act on the day of the election for nothing, and that those demanding compensation should be limited to \$1. This resolution was adopted, after which the convention adjourned.

Among those present at the meeting were: J. C. Perrault of St. Landry, Judge Julian Hucker of Iberia, Judge Julian Mouton of Lafayette, and P. J. Chappuis of Acadia, all of whom are spoken of as candidates. The fight promises to be hotly contested.


