

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GAME AND FISH LAWS.

Adopted by the Police Jury.
Moved, seconded and adopted by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish at the session of Sept. 1st, 1904, that the Parish Attorney be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to have published in the official journal the following game and fish laws as adopted:
Act No. 126, by Mr. Hunsicker, House Bill No. 57.
AN ACT.

For the protection of game animals, birds and fowls of the State of Louisiana, and fixing penalties for violations thereof.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That the Police Juries of the Parish of Iberia, both resident and migratory, found in this State, shall be, and are hereby declared to be the property of the State.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful in this State to catch, kill or pursue with such intent any wild deer, nor any of the following game birds: owls, swans, geese, brant, wild ducks, rails (mud hens) coots (poule d'eau) gallinules, surf birds, snipe, and plovers, curlews, plover (groesbe), wild turkeys, quails, doves, prairie hens, woodcock and woodcock, or have same in possession after they have been killed or caught, except as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That there shall be a period of seven months in each year in which it shall be lawful for any person to kill, snare or trap, hunt with hounds, or in any way annoy or destroy any wild deer, and that the Police Juries of the Parish of Iberia are hereby empowered to set the date on which the closed season shall begin and end, provided that the closed season so fixed by said Police Juries shall not be for a less period than the seven months before mentioned. And provided further that north of the 31st parallel of latitude the months of May, June, July and up to August 15th of each year shall in every instance be included in the closed season.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person to kill at any time a doe or a fawn.
Section 5. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person to kill, snare or trap, or in any way destroy any of the following named game birds and fowls between the dates of the closed season herein named: doves, rails, (mud hens) coots, (poule d'eau) gallinules, surf birds, snipe, sandpipers, curlews, tattlers, curlews, plover and groesbe, from March first to August first; Snipe from May first to September first; Wild ducks, swans, geese, and brant from April fifteenth to September first; Quail from March first to November first; Turkey from April first to December first.

Section 6. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person to snare or trap any wild turkey or, to kill or have in their possession a wild turkey hen, at any season of the year.

Section 7. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to catch or kill, or have in possession, any prairie hen, or woodcock (brancha) at any time during the next five following years after passage of this act and thereafter between March first and September first.

Section 8. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person to rob or destroy the nest or eggs of any birds or fowls named in this act.

Section 9. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful to kill any of the animals, birds, or fowls named in this act in the open seasons not herein by any means other than by an ordinary gun capable of being held to and shot from the shoulder.

Section 10. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person to kill or destroy more than twenty-five of the birds or fowls mentioned in Section two of this act in any one day during the open seasons named herein; snipe and wild ducks which number shall be limited to seventy-five nor more than six wild deer during the months from September the first to February the first.

Section 11. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, exchange, expose or offer for sale or exchange, or have in his or their possession, any of the game birds or fowls mentioned in Section five of this act, in the period during which they are intended to be protected by the provisions of this act, and this irrespective of the time or place they were killed or caught. It shall so be lawful for any person or persons or any corporation acting as a common carrier, its officer, agent, or servants to ship, carry take or transport, any of the game animals, birds and fowls enumerated in this act, which shall have been killed in this State beyond the confines of this State at any time, except that during the seasons in which game animals, birds and fowls may be killed; it shall not be unlawful for a hunter or a sportsman to carry with him beyond the confines of this State one wild deer or twelve game birds. Such hunter to make affidavit before a notary public that he has killed said animals and that they or it will not be sold.

Section 12. Be it further enacted, etc., That all packages containing dead game birds or parts thereof, when shipped within the State, shall be plainly and clearly marked with the names of the consignee and consignee, with an itemized statement of the number of birds and the names of the species, and said package shall be so constructed as to plainly show its contents.

Section 13. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any non-resident or unaturalized foreign born resident of Louisiana to hunt within the State unless he has in his possession, ready to exhibit to any warden or officer upon request, a license issued to him by the sheriff of the Parish in which he may be hunting. Such license shall be issued upon payment of fee of \$10.00, shall be non-transferable and shall be good during the open season of the year in which issued, and shall contain his signature as a means of identification. Every non-resident and unaturalized foreign born resident found hunting with out the aforesaid license may be arrested on \$25.00 nor more than \$50.00 or imprisonment in the parish jail not exceeding sixty days, or both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

Section 14. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any non-resident or unaturalized foreign born resident to kill game birds or animals in this State for profit either to himself or others, unless he has in possession, ready to exhibit upon request a license, issued to him by the sheriff of the parish in which he may be hunting. Such license shall be issued upon the payment of Twenty-five Dollars, shall be non-transferable and shall be good during the season of the year in which issued and shall contain his signature, as a means of identification. Every non-resident, or unaturalized foreign born resident, hunting game birds for profit either to himself or others without said license may be arrested on sight by any officer and shall be liable to a fine of not less than Fifty Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars, or imprisonment in the Parish jail not exceeding sixty days or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 15. Be it further enacted, etc., That any person or persons, or common carrier or their agents or officers, violating any of the provisions of this act, except Sections 13, 14, and 15 shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall on conviction thereof pay the costs of the prosecution and be fined not less than \$1 nor more than \$5 for each wild game bird fowl or animal unlawfully captured, killed, shipped out of the State or attempted to be shipped out, or had in possession during the closed seasons; or be imprisoned in the parish jail for not more than thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 16. Be it further enacted, etc., That all fees and fines collected under the provisions of this act, except as herein provided, shall go to a fund kept by the State Treasurer called the State game protective fund, of which the State Treasurer shall keep accurate accounts and report same to the Governor and General Assembly.

Section 17. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be the duty of the police juries of each parish of the State to appoint one or more reputable citizens to act as game wardens in that particular parish and said officers shall have power and authority to arrest without warrant any person or persons found violating any of the provisions of this act, and to search without warrant any cold storage or refrigerating plant, car, vessel, vehicle, or package, wherein he or they may believe any birds named in the act may be kept or stored contrary to the provisions of the act. The said game wardens so

appointed shall also have the right to confiscate all game birds which he or they may find in the possession of any person or persons during the close season and this irrespective of the time when or place where such birds may have been killed or caught, and such person or persons shall have no redress at law for such seizure of property unlawfully had in possession.

Section 18. Be it further enacted, etc., That any person or persons reporting to the game wardens or other officers authorized under the law of the State to institute a prosecution against any person or person, or corporations, for violations of the provisions of this act, shall receive for such report, in case of conviction 50 per cent of the fine collected from such person or persons or corporations; the remainder of the said fine levied and collected shall go to the State game protective fund. Otherwise the whole fine collected shall go to said State game protective fund.

Section 19. Be it further enacted, etc., That all laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 20. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act shall go into effect from and after its passage.

NON-GAME BIRDS.
Act No. 48, by Mr. Derouen, house Bill No. 103.
AN ACT.

For the protection of birds other than game birds, and their nests, eggs and to provide for the punishment of violations thereof.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That all birds other than game birds, both resident and migratory, in this State shall be and are hereby declared to be the property of the State.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That for the purposes of this Act, the following shall be considered game birds: Swans, geese, brant, wild ducks, rails (mud hens), coots, (poule d'eau), gallinules, surf birds, snipe, woodcock, sandpipers (chorooks), upland plover (paraboots), tattlers, curlew, plover (groesbe), wild turkey, prairie chickens, quail and doves. All other species of wild resident or migratory birds shall be considered non-game birds.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That no person, within the State of Louisiana shall kill, catch or have in his or their possession living or dead any resident or migratory wild bird other than a game bird or purchase, offer or expose for sale any wild non-game bird after it has been killed or caught except as permitted by this Act.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That no part of the plumage, skin or body of any bird protected by this Act shall be sold or had in possession for sale, and this irrespective of whether said bird was captured or killed within or without the State.

Section 5. Be it further enacted, etc., That no person within the State of Louisiana shall take or destroy, or attempt to take or destroy the nest or the eggs of any wild bird, other than a game bird, or have such nest or eggs in his or their possession, except as permitted in this Act.

Section 6. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons or any corporation acting as a common carrier, its officers, agents or servants, to ship, carry, take or transport, either within or beyond the confines of the State, any resident or migratory wild non-game bird, or except as permitted by this Act.

Section 7. Be it further enacted, etc., That Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6 of this Act shall not apply to any person holding a certificate giving the right to take birds, their nest or eggs for strictly scientific purposes, as provided for in Section 8 of this Act, nor does it prevent any householder from keeping any resident or migratory birds in cages as pets, provided they are not kept for sale, barter or exchange, and that they shall not be shipped beyond the confines of the State.

Section 8. Be it further enacted, etc., That certificates may be granted by the Secretary of State to any properly accredited person of the age of fifteen years or upwards, permitting the holder thereof to collect birds, their nest or eggs, for strictly scientific purposes only. In order to obtain such certificate the applicant must present to the Secretary of State written testimonials from two well-known ornithologists, certifying to the good character and fitness of said applicant to be entrusted with such privilege, and must pay to said officer one dollar to defray the necessary expenses attending the granting of such certificate. On proof that the holder of such certificate has captured or killed any bird, or taken the nest or eggs of any bird for other than scientific purposes, the certificate shall become void and he shall be liable to a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment of thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment.

Section 9. Be it further enacted, etc., That the certificates authorized by this Act shall expire on the 31st day of December of the year issued and shall not be transferable.

Section 10. Be it further enacted, etc., That the English sparrow, cooper's hawk, duck, hare, sharp-shinned hawk, and great horned owl, are not included among the birds protected by this Act. This Act does not prevent any person from killing crows or crow blackbirds on his premises if destructive to crops, provided that said birds are not sold or offered for sale or shipped out of the State.

Section 11. Be it further enacted, etc., That any person violating any of the provisions of this Act, except Section 8, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to a fine of not less than one dollar, nor more than five dollars, for each bird, living or dead, or part of a bird, or nest, or set of eggs or part thereof killed or captured or possessed, in violation of this Act, or be imprisoned in the parish jail for not more than thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment.

Section 12. Be it further enacted, etc., That all acts or parts of acts heretofore passed inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Act, are hereby repealed.

FISH LAW.
Act No. 144, house bill, No. 208.

To prevent the destruction of fish by poisoning, using dynamite, trapping, hedging, gill-netting and to prevent seining for game fish, and providing a penalty for the same, and authorizing and requiring the police juries to license seining for cat fish, gar, fish, buffalo and carp fish.

Section 1. Be it further enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to put any poison or poisonous substance, dynamite or explosive substance of any kind in any river, bayou, creek, lake, pond, or any stream, water course, or other body of water within the limits of the State of Louisiana, with the intent by the aforesaid means to kill or capture fish during any season of the year, or to seise (sic) in any river, bayou, creek, lake pond or stream within the limits of the State of Louisiana, with the intent by the aforesaid means to kill, capture or retard or prevent the free passage of game fish during any season of the year; provided that this act shall not be construed as to interfere with trigger trap or other traps placed near the edge of the water only and which do not retard or prevent the free passage of game fish, and provided further that this act shall not be construed to prevent the Police Juries of the respective parishes of this State from licensing seining for gar fish, buffalo, carp fish and cat fish, which are destructive of the spawn of game fish, that are common to the waters of this State. Provided that no seine be permitted with a mesh less than three inches, and provided further that no seining for the above mentioned fish be permitted without obtaining a license from the Police Jury of the Parish in which the seining is to be done.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That any violation of this act shall be construed a misdemeanor and may be tried before any court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That any person or persons violating this act shall, on conviction, be imprisoned not more than thirty days or fined not more than fifty dollars or both at the discretion of the court.
