

DEMOCRATS NOT BOASTFUL, BUT CONFIDENT.

In marked contrast to the brag-gadois of the Republicans is the well-grounded confidence of victory which prevails at the headquarters of the Democratic National Committee.

The belief that Parker and Davis will be elected is based upon the most trustworthy information that can be obtained at this time as to the temper and intention of the voters in the ten or twelve States outside of the "solid south," in which both parishes are fighting hard for supremacy, as well as upon an abiding faith in the intelligence and patriotism of the people when once they understand the issues of the campaign and the positions of the respective parties thereupon.

That Democratic prospects have been greatly improved within the past ten days is evident to any one with an eye to see and an ear to hear. This improvement is easily accounted for, first, by the splendid condition of the united Democracy in the State of New York; second, the fine impression made upon the country by Judge Parker through his letter of acceptance; and third, by the general era of good feeling in the party, which Judge Parker has created by his successful personal efforts to conciliate all factions and enlist the hearty support of certain Democratic leaders, who, for one cause or another, had been inclined to hold aloof and let the campaign take care of itself.

The foremost independent newspapers of the country, while perhaps not yet convinced that defeat is in store for the Republicans, nevertheless agree that the political tide is turning and that from now on it will set in strongly toward Parker and Davis.

Among the influential papers which hold to this view, are the New York Herald, the Brooklyn Eagle, the Philadelphia Ledger, the Boston Herald, and the Springfield Republican.

WAGE REDUCTION.

Notwithstanding the many claims being set up by Republicans to the effect that the income of wage-earners throughout the land have been increased about twelve per cent. under Republican rule, no figures have been submitted by any of them to substantiate this claim.

There appears to be very good reasons for this failure to submit figures. Principal among them is the all sufficient one that the only figures obtainable show that there have been reductions in wages averaging from ten to fifteen per cent., and this during the years 1903 and 1904, when the Republican party was in control of every branch of the National Government.

There was a reduction in the years of over ten per cent. in wages of textile workers in Philadelphia to the number of 100,000; tuck makers suffered a reduction of twenty per cent.; furance operators had their wages reduced on an average of about fifteen per cent.; steel workers had their incomes cut about ten per cent., as was also the case with iron workers, while glass workers suffered a cut of twenty per cent.

In many of the cotton and silk mills ten per cent. reduction in wages was exacted, and the platform workers of McKeesport, Pa., were assessed thirty per cent. Currgated iron workers were forced to give up twenty per cent. of their earnings; bridge builders had their wages reduced ten per cent.; railroad operatives on many of the large systems sustained a cut in wages of about fifteen cents a day, and the rule of reduction appears to have been applied to almost every branch of trade, affecting a great many thousand employees.

The International Mercantile Agency, headed, by ex-Director of Census Merriam, reports that the wages of more than 200,000 industrial employees were reduced not less than ten per cent. in 1903 and that 300,000 others suffered a like reduction in the early portion of 1904.

In addition to all of this, hundreds of mills employing hundreds of thousands of men closed down entirely in 1903, and Allegheny County, Pa., alone there are now over 10,000 idle men on account of closed mills.
