DEATH OF MR. ALBERT LANDRY.

Died, at his plantation residence near New Iberia on Thursday, June 2d, 1905, Mr. Albert Landry, aged 54 years, 6 months and 28 days.

The funeral obsequies were held at the Catholic church last Friday. Interment at the Catholic Cemetery. Mr. Landry leaves a widow and a large family of 9 children to mourn his loss, as follows: Ulysses, Leon J., Edmond N., Paul F., Mrs. Michel C. Romero, Mrs. Frank Decuir, Misses Noemie, Lydia and Estelle. Mr. Landry was one of our most progressive and patriotic citizens, always in the front in any movement for the advancement of his State and Parish; a firm believer in education, extending to all his children the best opportunities that money could obtain, knowing that it was the best investment he could make for them. His sturdy principles of right, justice and religion were inculcated in his children who revere his memory not so much as a father, but as a most lovely companion and friend, always in high spirits and even temper, but of true dignity when occasion required. He was loved and respected by the entire neighborhood in which he lived and no work or movement of importance was completed without invoking his valuable aid and counsel. His deeds of benevolence were innumerable, and performed in the scriptural manner, the right hand not knowing what the left did. His taking off in the prime of life was a calamity to his section as his weight and influence were uplifting and progressive, long will his place remain unfilled—long will the loss of this good citizen be deplored. To the sorrowing ones, the Enterprise extends its heartfelt sympathy.

BRYANT OUT OF IT.

Washington, June 7.—Louis P. Bryant of New Orleans, who came to Washington yesterday with the endorsement of the Republican organization of Louisiana for the apprenticeship of New Orleans, has given up all hope of procuring the position and left here to-night for Lexington, Va., to visit his son, who is at college there. By asking a few questions at the White House this morning Mr. Bryant got a dead straight line on the situation, and promptly threw up the sponge.

What he found out was that, even if President Roosevelt appointed him there was not the faintest shadow of a chance for his name to get through the Senate as long as Senators Foster and McEnery occupy seats in that body.

It is now probable that the Louisiana Republicans will endorse another man in place of Mr. Bryant, but who he will be can not be found out at this time. In the meantime, the names of J. G. Skipwith and Assistant Appraiser Sholars are still before the President. If the Republicans do not decide upon a suitable man the chances are that the plum will drop into the outstretched palms of Mr. Skipwith.
