ADJOURNED MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

NEW IBERIA, LA., June 22, 1905.
The Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia met this day pursuant to adjournment with Mayor G. C. Laughlin in the chair, and the following members present to wit: Messrs. R. D. Stansbury, John Fisher, Paul E. Voorhies, R. F. Delahoussaye, O. Renoulet and Louis Indest, Sr.

Mr. Renoulet on behalf of the Finance Committee asked for further time to report on the fixing of salaries.

The Mayor appointed the following persons on the cement sidewalk inspection: Messrs. L. Indest, Sr., R. F. Delahoussaye and E. Guillot.

It was moved by Mr. Renoulet, seconded by Mr. Fisher and carried, that the bond of the City Tax Collector be fixed at three thousand dollars.

An ordinance declaring the officers of Chief of Police and each of the deputy police of the City of New Iberia vacant from and after the 30th day of June, 1905, at two o'clock p. m., was presented by Mr. R. F. Delahoussaye and read, when it was moved by Mr. R. F. Delahoussaye, seconded by Mr. Stansbury and adopted by the following yeas and nays, to wit: Yea—Messrs. Stansbury, Fisher, Voorhies, Delahoussaye, Renoulet and Indest. Nay—None.

Said ordinance as above entitled, was then presented to the Mayor for examination and after examination was returned by him, approved and signed with the seal of the corporation thereto affixed. Said ordinance reads as follows, to-wit: Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia that the office of Chief of Police now held by Mr. H. M. Carter, and the offices of deputy police of the City of New Iberia, now held by Messrs. J. B. Finney, C. E. Colgin, W. O. Hugonin and Jas. Gilbin be and the same are hereby declared vacant from the 30th day of June, 1905, at twelve o'clock m., and the commissions, if any have been issued to said officers, are hereby revoked and annulled and rescinded from this date, and each of said officers discharged.

Thus done read, adopted and signed seal affixed in open session at New Iberia, La., on this 22nd day of June, 1905.

G. C. LAUGHLIN, Mayor.
It was moved by Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Voorhies and carried by a unanimous vote that Mr. Octave Renoulet be elected Mayor pro tem. during the present term.

It was moved by Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Indest and carried that all parties having bills against the City of New Iberia, be requested to present the same to the secretary on or before Thursday, the 29th of June, 1905.

It was moved by Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Delahoussaye and carried by a unanimous vote that the Mayor of the City be authorized on behalf of the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia to institute suit against all parties who fail or neglect to settle for cement sidewalks built in front of their properties in accordance with the terms of said sidewalk ordinance.

It was moved by Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Voorhies and carried that the Mayor be authorized to pay the expenses of a sick pauper from New Iberia to Alexandria, La.

It was moved by Mr. Renoulet, seconded by Mr. Fisher and carried that the Board adjourn until next Thursday evening the 29th of June at 8 o'clock, when the Board will meet for the transaction of any and all unfinished business.
