DEATH OF GEORGE N. FITZHUGH.

Last Sunday morning at 4:30 o'clock the soul of our venerable citizen passed to the great beyond. He was surrounded by his family and departed amid the shadows of the grand old oaks and the odors of the fragrant Magnolias of his elegant home, East End. For ninety-two years, Mr. Fitzhugh enjoyed the beautiful things of this earth, most of that time in peace and plenty, with but a short interval of adversity. In all the circumstances of life to which he, by a wise providence was called, he departed himself a man in the grandest sense of the word. Born in the State that gained for herself the title of "Mother of Presidents" he imbibed all those lofty ideals and that high sense of honor, which have ever characterized Virginia's sons. When the tocsin of war sounded Mr. Fitzhugh true to his State, buckled on the armor of the soldier and followed the fortunes of the Confederacy till the end at Appomattox. In the early seventies, Col. Fitzhugh and brother, Theodore and families came to Louisiana, purchasing a plantation in St. Martin Parish, which they operated for some years, moving thence to Washington, La., where he was engaged in various enterprises, coming from there to this City about ten years ago, purchasing the old Catholic College grounds formerly the old Lewis homestead and building thereon the stately home in which he died. In all of the positions in which Col. Fitzhugh was placed during his life with us, he discharged his obligations as a citizen, as a neighbor and friend with that regard for honor which permeated his whole life. Those left to mourn him are a wife who was his constant companion for 50 years, and a daughter Mrs. J. P. Russell, and grand daughter Miss Henrietta Russell. The funeral obsequies took place at the Church of the Epiphany, Rev. Dr. C. O. Kramer officiating, interment at the Protestant cemetery. Although the weather was very inclement, a large body of our citizens attended thus expressing their respect for the deceased. The Enterprise offers its sincere condolences and sympathy.

A new railway track layer, with a crew of forty men, will lay two miles of track a day. The track layer has a huge crane 60 feet long, which projects forward over the road and hauls behind it a train of sixteen flat cars loaded with ties and rails. A continuous double line of cars moves constantly over rollers and carries the ties with it. Both rails and ties are seized at the proper time by the machinery and placed on the road in front of the train, where they shortly form part of the track over which it passes. This device is said to be the most expeditious as well as economical track layer in the world.
